Bevin Asks Nations To State Aims Frankly

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Nov. 23 - Secretary Bevin in the House of Commons today asked that nations dispel world suspicion by stating their aims openly and frankly, and clashed with Winston Churchill, wartime Prime Minister, over the Labor Government's policy in Greece. Speaking in the second day of a foreign affairs debate, Mr. Bevin said he had suggested to the Greek Government that the nebulous aims of the Labor Government be stated openly and frankly. Mr. Churchill interrupted, shouting that it was a burning question in Greece. Mr. Bevin answered: "I defy anybody to run a blockade in Greece at the present time." Mr. Bevin explained that the suggestion for postponement originated with the Greek regent, Archbishop Damaskinos. Mr. Bevin told Commons that he had been disappointed by the postponement and admonished him to stick to it, if accepted.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 - (AP) - Cordell Hull, former United States Secretary of State, declined today to testify in a Senate hearing on the Pearl Harbor disaster. He said he was not in the United States at the time of the attack on Pearl Harbor Dec. 7, 1941. In a day-by-day account of diplomatic negotiations that preceded the attack, the venerable former cabinet officer made these points in a statement prepared for the Senate hearing investigating the Pacific military disaster.

Livestock Dutch Sailors Sat Out War In Halifax Jail

HALIFAX, Nov. 21 - Imprisoned in 1940 and 1941 for refusing to sail with their ships across the sea-battered Atlantic, four Dutch sailors have been sentenced to a year in the Halifax city prison. The four, whose names are being withheld, were placed under detention in 1940 at Montreal, according to information received here. The other three were imprisoned at Halifax in 1941 after deserting from their ship and then, after being charged with desertion, refusing to put to sea.

Her blindness has given her inspiration to train for aiding in the rehabilitation of blinded veterans. In her school activities it means that she must take her lecture notes in Braille.
