The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Lord's Day Alliance will be held in the Y. M. C. A. Building, Charlottetown this evening at 7.30 o'clock. The Association Secretary, Rev. W. G. Hanna will be present at this meeting, which will be of considerable importance. There will be considered the relation of the Lord's Day Act to the great interests of transportation by rail and boat, to the great industries, and to ordinary business, as well as to business of amusement, games, hunting, and other matters. The difficulties of enforcement will also come up for consideration. Much benefit is expected to follow this meeting. Every person interested will be present.

Last evening the B. Y. P. U. of the Baptist Church held the opening meeting of their winter course. A very good audience greeted an excellent program. Rev. T. F. Fullerton gave a brilliant and thoughtful address on "The Poet in Religion." The regular meeting of the school board was held last evening with a full representation. The teachers enrollment for the past month was 1100 the actual attendance, 1079, average attendance 997, percentage of attendance 93. There were 73 cases of tardiness reported, 5 cases of truancy, 125 visits made by the teachers, 56 notices, 14 cases of corporal punishment and 30 fell below average in grade. A deputation consisting of Rev. S. J. Woodruff, Ex Mayor Paton and J. D. Seaman were admitted and presented a petition signed by 500 rate payers, urging the board to provide Domestic Science for the girls in the city schools. The petition reads: "We the undersigned parents and tax payers, realizing the importance of instruction in Household Science would respectfully, but urgently, request, that you, make such provision as will enable the female pupils of the school to obtain the benefit of such instruction at Prince of Wales College. After some discussion the following resolution was agreed to: That this petition be referred to the City Council with the hope on the part of the Board that as they have seen their way to provide for teaching Manual Training to the boys, they may also be able to provide for teaching Domestic Science to the girls of the city."

In the storm on Saturday and Sunday, the tern schooner Calabria, Capt. McLean, was driven ashore at Falulation Cove near Summerside. The Calabria was a schooner of 450 tons, owned by Christopher Steen of St. John and had a cargo of lumber from Campbellton, N. B., for Boston. The schooner arrived off Summerside harbor on Friday last, anchoring in Bedeque Inner Roads in an easterly gale. During the night the wind suddenly shifted to the westward and blew with hurricane force causing the vessel to drag her anchor. On Sunday morning she struck heavy aft, driving her rudder up through her rudder post, destroying the casing and causing the vessel to fill with water. Capt. McLean, when he found the vessel filling slipped one of the anchors to prevent the vessel from foundering in deep water, when the force of the wind drove her up on the bar of Falulation Cove. She draws seventeen feet of water and is now lying in twelve feet. The vessel is uninsured. The cargo is insured through a Boston office. Capt. Read, the underwriters agent was in communication with the captain, who landed at Bedeque yesterday morning. The captain and crew are still aboard and will remain there until the arrival of the owner tonight.
