The Propylæum Society, composed of the young women of Acadia College, gave a brilliant reception in College Hall on Saturday evening. The guests were received by the president, Miss Alberta McKinley, North River, P. E. I., and Miss Burgess, Wolfville Ex. 31.

The death took place at his home, Head of Cardigan, on February 15th, after a few weeks illness which he bore with Christian patience and resignation to the divine will of Donald Matheson, aged 86, one of the oldest inhabitants in the vicinity of Cardigan, and one who was highly respected and esteemed. The sad news came as a great shock to the members of his family who are in distant lands and to a large circle of friends who came in contact with him. He was born in Lochearn, Ross-shire, Scotland, and came to this Island in the year 1812, where he has been a resident ever since. He and Mr. Stewart organized a Sabbath School, of which Mr. Matheson was Superintendent and teacher for forty years. He leaves a sorrowing widow, four sons and four daughters, Mrs. M. Nicholson of Rat Portage, Ontario; Mrs. Wm. Galbraith, Prince Albert, N. W. T.; Mrs. Wm. Matheson, Rustico; Angus, Captain in the Lintport and Hurl Line, England; Renwick, M. D. in Boston; John in Maine, Christina and George at home, all of whom keenly feel the loss of a kind and loving father. Although the roads were very bad, a large number of friends followed the remains to their last resting place in the family plot at Cardigan. The pallbearers were John G. Scrimgeour, Angus Sutherland, Archibald McEachern, Daniel McEachern, Allan Shaw, D. J. McKinnon. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Edward Smith, M. A., Cardigan.

After a lingering illness borne with Christian grace and fortitude, Mrs. J. A. McDonn of San Francisco passed to her eternal reward at her father's home in North Rustico on Sunday, March 26th. With a deep infatigable trust in her divine Master and Lord, she was patient in all her suffering and submissive to His Holy Will. Death to her, had no terror; it was as she herself expressed it, simply "Going Home," the portal through which she would enter into life more abundant. Many will miss the sweet smile, the kindly word of cheer, and long will our hearts yearn, "For the touch of a vanished hand, and the sound of a voice that is still." Our dear one has reached the "Homeland" for which she longed and we know that our loss is her eternal gain. The funeral took place on Tuesday March 21st and was very largely attended. Rev. Ewen Macdonald and Rev. John Simpson conducted the service, the former speaking very impressively from II Timothy 1 and 10th. "Who hath abolished death and hath brought life and immortality to light through the gospel." Mr. McWilliams was unmarried and leaves besides his father and mother, five sisters and two brothers, namely, Mrs. B. A. Parslow and Miss Olive, trained nurses in New York; Mrs. D. L. M. Keith, Worcester; Miss Margaret attending Business College in the city, Miss Fanny and Victor S. at home and S. N. McWilliams in Newburyport. To the bereaved family The Guardian extends sympathy.
