Great Racing Witnessed at Kensington

Thrilling Finishes And Upsets In Near Every Heat Feature Harness Meet

In the most thrilling and exciting day's racing witnessed on an Island track this season, Raymond Budlong, Millie Kalmuck, Uscita Britton and Beaverdale were returned winners at the Kensington race meet yesterday while close to 1500 excited fans also witnessed the fastest times of the season being rung up. As a result of the fast times, over a lightning-like track and perfect racing weather, Millie Kalmuck and Uscita Britton today sport new racing records, Millie, the Island's grand old campaigner going the second heat of the 2:15 trot and pace in 2:11 with the Uscita Britton mare getting an identical mark in the second heat of the Classified Trot & Pace.

These were but a few of the features witnessed during a great day's racing but in addition upssets featured almost every heat and in every heat thrilling, breath-taking finishes were the order as the drivers staged thrilling stretch-drives to push their horses under the wire inches to the good.

The victory of Beaverdale in the 2:26 trot and pace was the biggest upset. Pope Clarke's big trotter, ably driven by Pat McKenna came through to win the first heat of the race and then after being beaten by Ethel Bellini—incidentally driven by George Hooper, making a return to the sulky after a number of years' lay-off—and Scotty Watson in the third heat came back strong to chalk up his first victory over an Island track by taking the extra heat from the other two heat winners.

3-Year-Old Handicap

First Heat—Lusty's First and Kelly's Nightmare had a fifty-foot handicap on the two pacers, Raymond Budlong and Jack Clyde as the field came to the wire.

Way on the second score Lusty's First had the rail around the first turn but went to a break. Raymond Budlong and Jack Clyde, pacing very fast went up the back stretch neck and neck to open up a big lead on the trotters. Right past the stands Jack Clyde held on to his slight lead. Hitting into the first turn the second trip around Budlong tucked in holding the position to the top of the stretch; here Driver McNeil pulled out for a drive but he couldn't catch the Clyde horse who won the heat by half a length. Kelly's Nightmare was third with Lusty's First fourth. The mile was in 2:24 1-2 with the first half being in 1:09.

Second Heat—They went away on the second score with Kelly's Nightmare in front. Joe O'Brien took the pole at the second turn with Lusty's First only in turn to lose it. Raymond Budlong hitting into the backstretch, Jack Clyde who had come to a break just as the word was given was far back. At the half Budlong was still in the lead followed by Lusty's First, Jack Clyde who had moved up from fourth and Kelly's Nightmare. For the last half positions continued the same Raymond Budlong winning the heat easily. Lusty's First was second after going to a break at the eighth in attempting a drive. Jack Clyde was third and Kelly's Nightmare fourth. The mile was in 2:26.

Third Heat—Away on the third score Raymond Budlong paced around the field to take the rail at the second turn. Hitting the pole turn both trotters, Lusty's First and Kelly's Nightmare broke which dropped them far back. Raymond Budlong wasn't headed the remainder of the race although Jack Clyde was at his wheel half-way down the stretch before going to a break.

2:15 Trot & Pace

First Heat—Major Bowes was on bad behavior and with Direct L. falling to take the field down to the wire, he having the pole, it took eleven scores to get the field away and only after Starter McLeod had sent Direct L. to the outside of the track and told the drivers to score by Millie Kalmuck when they finally got away Albert

Highland track And field meet At Antigonish

ANTIGONISH, N. S., July 16—(CP)—Athletes of the Antigonish Highland Society gathered in 43 points today to take first place in the annual Highland games track and field meet before approximately 3,000 fans.

A field dominated by men of the three services, three Antigonish boys garnered 11 points apiece to share first place as individual point-makers. Jasper Myles of New Glasgow, N. S., with ten points was one behind Douglas Leadbetter. Terry Thompson and Les Tupolec.

Team event, Lehigh, N. S., placed second in the team standings with 36 points and Aldershot's score was broken for the Bebe to fall far back. First Heat—Away on the third score Silent Mac led the field of eight around the first turn with the favored Paul Abbe going to a break and falling far back as he tried to snap the rail. The entire field "tucked in" going up the back stretch and as they waded down by the judges' stand Silent Mac had a length lead followed by Peter Reamer, Beaverdale, Lucky Guy, Scotty Watson, Ethel Bellini, Paul Abbe and Voio Scott.

The crowd sensed a stretch drive as the field held tight right to the last eighth. And they weren't wrong. As Peter Reamer and Beaverdale began applying the "heat" the remainder followed suit, but it was the lightly-regarded Beaverdale, given a sensational old-time drive by Pat McKenna, who won his first heat on an Island track by nipping Silent Mac at the wire, by a nose. Scotty Watson moved up to third, Peter Reamer fourth and the remaining four fighting close battles for the remaining positions.

Second Heat—George Hooper, making a return to the sulky after a long absence paved the way for the most startling upset of the day as he drove Ethel Bellini home in front in 2:14. After he got the word, Paul Abbe who got away in front on the outside took the rail from Beaverdale on the second turn. For three-quarters of the heat it was a two-horse race. But from here home things happened very fast. Just into the stretch Paul Abbe jumped it off followed almost immediately by Beaverdale and Ethel Bellini came through very fast to top the heat after finishing sixth the first turn. Beaverdale took to the front followed by Scotty Watson and Paul Abbe. At the upper turn as Scotty Watson and Paul Abbe went to drives Beaverdale went to a break and lost all chance Scotty Watson trotting steadily to take the heat comfortably with Paul Abbe second and the remainder of the field spread out.

Fourth Heat—Away on the second score Scotty Watson trotted to a two length lead in the first quarter of the mile with Beaverdale and Ethel Bellini trailing. Hitting into the stretch Beaverdale and Ethel Bellini started to close the gap up the back stretch and around into the stretch Scotty still held the lead but in the stretch duel Beaverdale had too much "give" winning by half a length in 2:16; Scotty Watson second, Ethel Bellini third.

First Heat—The field of five got away on the first score and the crowd got their second thrill as Bebe McElwyn tried for the pole on the first turn but Uscita Britton pacing very fast, had her sulky just touch the wheel of McElwyn; the latter went to a break dropping to fifth with the Britton mare opening up a two length lead and at the half it was Uscita Britton in the lead followed by Bonnie Scott, Bebe McElwyn who had moved up to second, June Evans and Lusty Frisco. The field remained unchanged as they flashed under the wire with Bonnie Scott pacing very fast, finishing at Uscita Britton's wheel. The mile was in 2:12, another fast heat over a fast track.

Suspension came about when the judges decided that O'Brien was guilty of reckless driving and improper driving in the third heat of the Classified Trot & Pace.

Track record Shattered at Amherst meet

AMHERST, N. S., July 16—(CP)—While 1,300 spectators watched, Amherst's harness racing track record was shattered today.

After equalling the previous mark of 2:10, All Grattan, owned by C. Alexander of Saint John, N. B., clipped it by half a second in taking the second heat of the free for all in a three event card.

Then, assured of first money, the new record holder ate the dust of Joe Direct, driven by Tom Etter of Moncton, N. B., in the third heat.

All Grattan's time bettered the 2:10 miles turned in by Walter Brown in 1938 and Jane Azoff a year later. Driving the free-for-all to the new mark was L. Semple. Halifax horses cleaned up first money in the other two events. Flo Direct took three straight heats in the 2:20 Trot and Pace while San Ton, after placing fourth in the first heat, took the last two in the Classified Race. Skippy Dale, driven by Etter, took second money in the 2:20 while Marting Bell, owned by Frank O'Neil of Saint John, accomplished the same feat in the classified.

CLEVELAND, July 16—(AP)—The red-hot New York Yankees put a 10-3 crusher on Cleveland Indians today, booming their American League lead to six full games as Joe DiMaggio hit safely for his 56th straight contest.

Charlie Keller's fourth-inning homer over the right field wall broke a 2-2 deadlock and sent the bombers on to their triumph.

DiMaggio lost no time in keeping alive his consecutive hitting streak, singling through the box in the first inning and adding a single, a double and a walk as the opener of the three-game July "pennant series" developed into a rout.

At Chicago Coell Tex Hughson, turning in his third straight victory since Boston Red Sox recalled him from Louisville, held White Sox to four hits to shake Buck Ross, 2-1, in a burly "duel" settled in the ninth inning.

At St. Louis, Chet Laabs had a perfect day at bat hitting two home runs, a triple and a double in four times up to lead the Browns to an 11-2 conquest of Philadelphia Athletics.
