The following is from an Ottawa exchange:--Always an advocate of the expansion of Maritime Provinces transportation facilities, Hon. H. R. Emmerson purposes to put pressure upon the government to secure better connection between Prince Edward Island and the mainland. To this end he has given notice of a resolution, which he will bring before the house immediately after recess, declaring that it is desirable in furtherance of the transportation interests of this Dominion that the sphere of influence of the government system of railways of Canada should be widened, enlarged and extended by the establishment of a modern steam ferry railway car service between the Intercolonial railway and the Prince Edward Island railway, thereby connecting these two branches of the government railway system, and to that end, that the gauge of the Prince Edward Island railway be widened so as to permit of the transportation of freight and passenger cars and other rolling stock from the Intercolonial to and over along the Prince Edward Island railway without transfer of either freight or passengers.

Three drunks, one arrested Saturday and two last night, will appear before His Honor this morning at the City Police Court.

In the First Methodist Church last evening Rev. Dr. Endicott, Toronto, who for the past eighteen years in China as a Missionary of the Methodist Church of Canada, occupied the pulpit and delivered one of the strongest sermons on missions heard in this city for some time. Rev. Dr. Endicott did not present to the congregation any complicated figures but in a clear and concise manner gave the very large congregation present an idea of the complexity of the evangelic problem of West China and related a few experiences in that country in mission work which only proved conclusively that there are manifold difficulties to be overcome in planting the gospel in the half a hundred tribes which constitute the population of West China. In his closing appeal, after giving an instance of the marvellous conversion of a whole tribe, the speaker said that there was no heresy like indifference, no blindness like that which fails to see the necessities of the heathen and no sin like the sin of selfishness. His address was refreshing, enlightening and punctuated with passages of satire and humor, so much did these qualities of speech predominate that the two hour service was neither tiresome nor monotonous for those present who were deeply interested in the learned speaker's remarks.

OTTAWA, December, 8--The Duke of Connaught will before long receive a Government House a unique gift in the form of a prayer containing three hundred and ninety letters inscribed on a grain of wheat. The work is being done by Aaron Kirshchlioff, who lives near Edmonton, Alberta.

A telegram from there says:--"Among many other wonders which the Peace River country is destined to produce in the wheat line, according to Bert Hendley, a householder from that country, is a challenge for the peculiar championship claimed by Baucha Mordecai, son of Zeebi Hirsch Scheinmann, of Jerusalem. The would-be champion is Aron Kirshchlioff. He has selected a particularly large, perfect grain of wheat and is engaged, during his spare winter evenings, in inscribing upon it, in letters so small that only a powerful microscope could make it readable, a prayer for the Duke of Connaught. Kirshchlioff expects to complete his task this winter and will then forward the odd little token of loyalty to Rideau Hall."

"The only other known instance of such difficulty and painstaking work is that of the champion prayer of 380 Hebrew letters upon a grain of wheat for Sir Moses Montefiore. Sir Moses kept the prayer until his death, and it is now in the possession of one of his friends. Kirshchlioff intends to inscribe 390 letters on his grain of Peace River wheat."

It is, however, possible that His Majesty may acquire a residence in the South of Ireland, which is noted for the excellence and variety of its fishing and shooting.

BRUCE RIDPATH IS RECOVERING

TORONTO, December 8--According to his own statement, Bruce Ridpath, the playing manager of the Toronto Pros., will play hockey this winter. The terrible injuries which he received in the auto accident on November 2, have healed sufficiently to allow the popular all-round crack to sit up in bed, and he will leave St. Michael's Hospital the end of the week. He is rapidly regaining his former strength and expects to be able to begin training within a few weeks. After the different reports that have been circulated regarding Ridpath's condition, this will come as the biggest kind of a surprise. There were many who thought that Ridpath would never again be able to play hockey, while for weeks he regarded in society as the leader of the best dressed men brigade, and it is not easy to imagine one of his friends having sufficient courage to go into his presence attired in anything likely to be considered daring, or in any way opposed to good taste. BRITISH SPY CONVICTED IN LEIPSIG
