**OFF FROM SPEED TO NEW GADGETS** (Canadian Press)

**LONDON**, March 30 — Sir Malcolm Campbell has turned his talents to speed to the benefit of the British armored car forces.

The 56-year-old Briton whose "Bluebird" motor boats, and auto-racers have been setting records for 30 years, has designed a new type of armored car and has turned out a number of inventions, one of which is a "jet" engine.

Sir Malcolm stored his speedy cars and boats shortly after Great Britain's entry into the war in September, 1939. He refused a promotion from his present captaincy, instead organizing and commanding a motorcycle company.

From that he moved into the laboratory, and for several months has been spending long hours in experimental work.

"All my life my hobby has been speed," he said. "I've always worked with speedy motor boats and cars. Now I find myself absorbed with entirely different automotive problems and I am pleased that my experiments have proved of some value."

Whether Sir Malcolm's experiments also include work on England's fast motor patrol boats was not disclosed. Officially, his work is termed "military secret."

But if he should be, he might make those patrol boats hard to catch. Shortly before the war started, Sir Malcolm skittered his Bluebird over the waters of Fozzle Coniston in England at 141.74 miles an hour. Preston patrol boats do possibly half that.

**HEALTH**

TORONTO—That excessive mental labor is more likely than hard physical labor to cause arteriosclerosis — hardening of the arteries — and that more men than women suffer from that malady, were among the statements made today by a physician connected with the Health League of Canada.

A well-established condition of arteriosclerosis is made apparent by the rigid and tortuous condition of the arteries which, to the touch, feel like a string of beads, said the speaker. The earlier symptoms are less definite and often are so slight as to pass unnoticed.

These symptoms, he pointed out, arise from a diminished blood supply resulting from the thickened condition of the arteries which reduces their inner capacity. Naturally, symptoms vary according to the parts of the body which are being deprived of a normal blood supply.

Thus, if the arteries supplying the brain are affected, there will be a loss of memory, inability to sleep properly, defectiveness of judgment, irritability and despondency. In the aged, sufferers are especially liable to become drowsy. During the day they are drowsy.

Arteriosclerosis affecting the heart produces changes in the condition and functioning of that organ, said the speaker. The change is likely to be shown first by a loss of breath. The attacks come on suddenly at night. Sometimes the patient is afraid to go to sleep. At others the attacks resemble bronchial asthma. In cases where the muscle of the heart is much affected, or there is a coronary defect, there is likely to be distress in front of the heart. This condition is aggravated by such exertion as walking against the wind.

Angina pectoris may develop with disease of the coronary arteries. Finally there may be thrombosis — plugging of the vessels by a clot of blood. Total loss of memory or speech may follow, or there may be partial paralysis or a stroke of apoplexy.

Other conditions resulting from arteriosclerosis were described by Dr. Grosvenor, who admitted that little was known with certainty regarding the causes of the disease. Heredity appears to be a factor, he declared, while typhoid fever and rheumatism have long been thought to produce changes in the arteries. Scarlet fever, diphtheria and influenza are also blamed. Infected teeth, tonsils, sinuses, gall bladder, prostate or appendix probably are exciting causes. However, diagnosis is difficult, he said, and treatment should be directed by the doctor.
