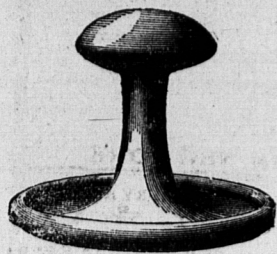

Rev. H. C. Rice, pastor of the Newcastle, N. B. Methodist church, and quite well known in this Province, has been invited to return for a third year.

Miss Isabel S. MacMillan, daughter of Capt. D. J. R. MacMillan of Wood Islands, and John W. Wheeler of Commonwealth Motor and Driving Club, Watertown, were married in Boston Wednesday, Jan 8th.

The St. John preachers meeting, having the appointment of a chaplain for the Industrial School, St. John, for the next six months, has chosen Rev. J. B. Champion, for that work. Mr. Champion was at one time stationed in this Province.

Rev. R. G. Shearer, D. D., general secretary of the social and moral reform committee of the Presbyterian church throughout Canada who recently visited this Province was taken suddenly ill on his arrival there Saturday morning and is now under the doctor's care at the Royal Hotel, Moncton. It is thought that Dr. Shearer's illness is due to overwork. He was somewhat improved next day and expressed the hope of being able to leave for Moncton Tuesday. Dr. Shearer is on a trip through the Maritime Provinces and goes from Moncton to St. John.

New Brunswick boast of an old resident in the person of Mrs. Anna Holt of St. John, N. B., who is nearly as old as Mrs. Stanlake of this Province. The St. John Sun says there lives in the West Side a woman who was born 104 years ago yesterday. She is Mrs. Anna Holt and the first saw the light of day in a village in County Sligo, Ireland, in 1804. Mrs. Holt bears her tremendous burden of years with remarkable ease. She reads with the aid of glasses and frequently knits stockings and mittens. She is quite bright and vivacious and an entertaining conversationalist. One of her peculiarities is that she prefers not to sit in a rocking chair or on an easy chair, choosing always an ordinary straight-backed chair.

A Provincial correspondent writing to the Farmer's Advocate says: "The prices have acted somewhat strange this fall. Pork started in at 8c. dressed for best quality, and in a few weeks it had dropped just 2 cents per pound for the same grade of pork, but at present writing 7 cents can be paid for a real choice carcass weighing from 125 to 200 pounds. Don't hear anything about over-fat pigs this fall. A farmer need not worry about being cut over-half or a cent per pound on a very fat hog. The trouble this year seems to be all the other way. With oats at 50 cents a bushel, and the prospect of potatoes being very high in the spring, too many farmers killed and marketed their hogs in a very unsalable condition. Pork that is too lean and thin to fry itself should be returned slaughtered. There is no encouragement for the man who sells a good fat hog here to-day. How different with the beef buyer? A butcher comes to the barn, looks over the stall-fed cattle, and it seldom he is willing to pay the same price per pound for all the animals. He pays according to quality every time, but it is not so with pork, at least here on P.E.I., and very often the man with the poorest article is the one who wants the long price. It is unfortunate, however, for those who have sold their hogs and fed them a lot of high-priced feed, and now are committed not too much money in pork this fall at 8c, and 9c, would have been more in proportion to the price of the feed they ate. This has been a banner year in the dairy industry; prices of both cheese and butter have been high—cheese, 12c to 13c, and butter started at 24c, and run up to nearly the 30c mark. Many of the factories are paying the patrons of the summer's milk, at a little over a dollar per hundred. This is, indeed, a handsome price for milk, besides having the by-product to feed to calves and hogs. Some people are heard continuously crying down the cow, and the slavish work of milking, and after all there is nothing which pays better on the farm than dairying. Apples are very scarce, and very high in price. Our merchants are obliged to pay for imported Gravensins, Baldwins, Spies and Pippins, No. 1 quality, \$4.75 per barrel, and hard to get at any price.

The following facts were noted during the past year by John McSwain, of this City, and verses of the Botanical Club of Canada—Botanical—Alder shedding pollen, May 10; Aspen shedding pollen, May 21; Red Maple shedding pollen, May 18; Red Maple in leaf, June 4; Mayflower in bloom, April 28; Dandelion in bloom, May 25; Cherry (cultivated) in bloom, June 10; Apples in leaf, June 10; Apple in flower, June 12; Lilac in leaf, May 20; Lilac in flower, June 24; Hawthorn (Cococinea) flowering, June 20; Wheat, spring sowing, May 17; Wheat harvesting, Sept 11; Zoological, Song sparrow arrives, April 8; Robin arrives, March 31; Junco arrives, April 8; Swallow arrives, May 24; Night hawk arrives, June 14; Wild geese (going north), March 18; Wild geese (going south) Sept 16; Frogs piping April 23; Closing of rivers, Jan 1, 1908; First snow, October 20; frost June 4; First autumn frost September 28; Opening of rivers April 23; First snow October 20; March frost October 21; Thunder or lightning noted June 24th, 26th, July 1st, 4th, 7th, 9th, 17th, 18th, 27th, August 3rd, 12th, 13th, 16th, 18th, 27th, September 27th, Total 17 times. All these observations are for this Province.

**VACCINATION NOTICE**  
In accordance with the provisions of the 'Vaccination Act, 1886' the Superintendent of Vaccination for Charlottetown will be at the office of the undersigned, 178 Kent Street, on **Wednesday and Saturday** from 1.30 to 3.30 p. m. and 6.30 to 9 p. m.  
The Law requires that all unvaccinated persons of the age of three months or upwards, must be present to be vaccinated; children under twelve years of age to be brought by one of their parents or their guardian.  
The charge for vaccination will be twenty-five cents for each person to be paid at the time of such vaccination.  
Any person failing or neglecting to attend, or bring his or her young children at the above time and place will be subject to the fines and penalties of the vaccination Act.

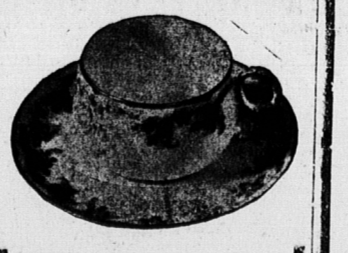
