QUEBEC'S MINERAL DEPOSITS

CASCAPELIA, Que., July 8.—Great interest is being aroused in the new finds of copper and large deposits of zinc and lead on the properties of the Federal Zinc and Lead Company, in the Gaspé Peninsula, which company has a number of men at work trenching, and a large number of veins have been uncovered.

The district is on the Bale de Chalcar, about forty-five miles inland from Cascapeia, and can be reached by automobile. On account of the mining developments going on, the road is being improved, and this work has been undertaken by the Quebec Government, who have a gang of men at work this week. The Hon. J. F. Perrault, Minister of Mines, is visiting the property, accompanied by A. O. Dufresne, Director of Mines of the Quebec Government, and J. Y. Murdoch, F. M. Connell, Department of Natural Resources, Canadian National Railways, Reginald E. Hore, Consulting Geologist of the same department, also visited the properties this week.

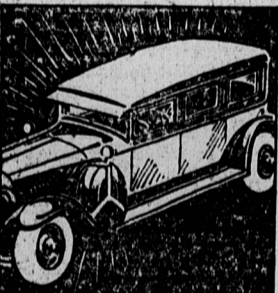
