**—A FEW ELOQUENT FACTS AND FIGURES.**—Palmer Road Institute sold 1,220 lambs and fat sheep to The New England Meat and Wool Co., represented here by Mr. Chally, whose agents are Mr. J. J. McNally and Mr. Roy Silliphant, Summerside, two experienced and much-alive buyers of lambs and cattle by the way. This Institute leads more in prices received, number of lambs sold and money realized. All lambs 65 lbs. and over, 7 1/2 cts.; fat sheep 5 cts.; amount realized \$7,215.88. Mr. James Cadigan received \$156.54 for lambs. Mr. Joe Dunbar's ewes netted him \$112 in 14 lbs. fleeces. Dennis O'Brien sold one lamb for \$10.15 and his 17 heads averaged 104 lbs. or \$7.64 per lamb or \$15.08 for twins. Mr. Joseph Polier's lambs also averaged 104 lbs. Mr. Charles Pridham received \$20.44 for the lambs of one ewe. Mr. James Gillis received \$9.95 for a fat ewe. The Palmer Road Institute bought 12 pure-bred Shropshire rams this season—9 beauties from Mr. Archibald, Truro, a real good one from Mr. L. H. D. Foster, York, and two from Mr. Clay, Bridgetown. Good breeding and loyal co-operation is the motto of this Institute and that gets the price every time. Another move being inaugurated by this Institute is the shearing and dipping of their flocks co-operatively. This will greatly facilitate the grading, as all the wool will be uniformly packed. Mr. Reid, District Representative, is doing good work in Prince in encouraging sheep husbandry.

**—S. S. SENLAC.**—The steamer Senlac is due in Summerside this morning and will complete loading for Newfoundland direct. Her cargo from here consists of 4,000 bags potatoes, 500 bags oats, besides a number of head cattle and sheep.—C.
