FRESHWATER PEARL FISHING.

(By Thomas M. Cisel.) It will probably seem strange to many people to hear of pearls being found in fresh waters of the United States... The work of catching the clams is hard, dirty and unhealthy; but the lure of a valuable find calls many new fishermen to the field each year.

the pearls and 'slugs' taken from the Wabash alone is estimated at more than one million dollars a year. Several 'wholesale' methods of catching the clams have been experimented with. Steam shovels and pumps, and other curious devices have been used, but with poor success.

After a short drag has been made, and most of the hooks are filled, the net is hoisted into a boat and the empty one thrown out, to be filled while the catch is removed from the first. The operation is continued until the boat is well loaded, when a return to camp is made. Here the catch is 'cooked out'.

CANADA CANNOT HERSELF IGNORE MONROE EDICT

This is the View Enunciated Editorially Today by the New York Press

MEANS ONLY U. S. ADVANTAGE And U. S. Will Withstand Attempt by Any European Nation to Get Foot-hold Here

The story of the German ambassador is the voice of the Kaiser. It is the Kaiser, therefore, who must be held responsible for this statement of the German embassy in Washington, itself an explanation of another statement made the day before: 'The German point of view is that by joining in an European war Canada has put herself outside of the pale of the Monroe Doctrine, but Germany has not the intention of attacking Canada or of colonizing Canada.' It is just as well that the Kaiser has no such intentions. Whether he had or not would make no difference to the Monroe Doctrine. For the American point of view is that Canada, willy nilly, cannot put herself outside the pale of the Monroe Doctrine so long as the United States possesses the power to enforce the Monroe Doctrine. The Kaiser cannot say when Canada ceases to be within the pale of the Monroe Doctrine; Canada herself cannot say. The Monroe Doctrine does not depend upon Canada or upon any act of Canada. It depends upon this gov-

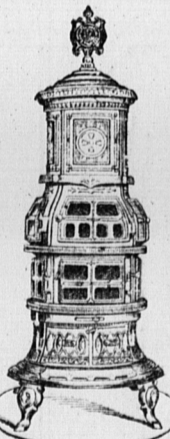
