CHANGE AT LIGHT PLANT.—  
Yesterday the plant of the Mar-  
time Light and Power Co. Super-  
intendent J. F. McKee and his as-  
sistant Mr. A. Green, with the full  
staff were engaged in changing  
over the machinery to enable the  
Anthracite producers to do the  
work of supplying gas for the  
machines in place of the Bituminous  
producer which is being taken  
down for repairs. Owing to the  
quality of coal the lining of this  
latter machine is badly damaged  
by clinkers and the contract for  
re-lining has been awarded to Mr.  
Jas. Gormley, who with a number  
of workmen start work at once. It  
will take about a month to make  
the necessary repairs and during  
that time the load will be carried  
by the anthracite or hard coal pro-  
ducers.
