AFTER THIS—WHAT

A vivid picture of some of the life of pre-war Britain was drawn and compared with the Britain of the post-war world by Dr. Courtney Weeks. While allowing for much that was beautiful and good in our English conditions, we must combat and eradicate the evils in our national life, so that the actual pre-war Britain should not return.

DOES OF SUBMERGED WEALTH

First on the list of pre-war evils, Dr. Weeks mentioned Britain's millionaires and a half unemployed—great stagnant pools of labour, "not only submerged wealth." Not only were these chronically unemployed masses deprived of the privilege of creative work, but they were in large numbers carrying on the impossibility of the "smalling poverty" of thousands of "unfortunate" people who were afflicted by a pre-war record of "chronic poverty" who were "poor to have been on the verge of poverty, and a further 11,000

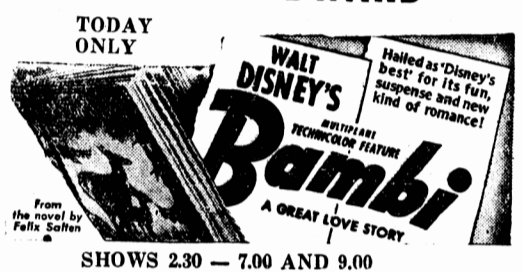

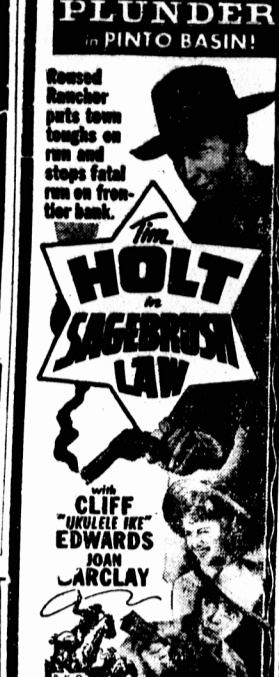

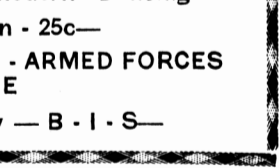
