

Canadiens Lead N.H.L. But Bow To Rangers 7-1

(By The Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Feb. 2.—New York Rangers handed Montreal Canadiens their worst beating of the season tonight when they scored a 7-1 victory over the National League leaders before a Madison Square Garden crowd of 15,926. Montreal, which stepped into first place Saturday night by beating the Rangers 2-1 on Canadian ice, stayed in top slot because the Toronto Maple Leafs, one point behind, were idle tonight.

The Canadiens, rolling along on a five game winning streak, took an early lead tonight and then saw the Rangers score seven goals. Maurice (Rocket) Richard was the goal of the match, drawing a minor penalty himself in the second period. While he was off New York scored twice, thus starting an avalanche that sank the Habs.

Outplayed for fully two-thirds of the game, Canadiens sent a crowd of 11,283 home happily by taking advantage of their breaks to hammer home goals by Billy Reay and Maurice Richard, while Rangers lost at least three goals by inches or seconds before Tony Leswick finally banged one past goalie Bill Durnan with less than three minutes of the game left.

IN THIS CORNER

You have been reading stories for the past week or so about the plans that are being made to add Cincinnati to the National Hockey League, with Frank Selke, present major domo of the Canadiens and Montreal Forum, as chief executive.

While the sports writers of that Ohio metropolis are, for the most part, enthusiastically behind seeing their city added to the wheel of Big Time hockey, it is understandable that they are not so enthusiastic about the fact that it is largely out of town capital—a goodly portion of it from Toronto—which is backing the venture. Some idea of the way eye with which Cincinnati scribes are viewing the project can be gathered from the following excerpts from a column written by Joe Aston, sports editor of the Boston Post.

"The men who plan to build and operate that \$2,000,000 sports arena held a meeting in Cincinnati Monday. It was officially labeled as a meeting of the board of directors of Cincinnati Gardens, Inc.

"There were men from Toronto and Montreal and from Chicago. There were men well-known in business and professional circles of Cincinnati. They met and elected officers and they talked about how much this and that would cost and when they were finished they adjourned to the Queen City Club and had cocktails with the boys from the newspapers and the radio.

"It was one of those hazy, hurried kind of gatherings, with everybody trying to talk at once, but there was a big amount of worthwhile information to be picked up, too.

"There were many at the gathering. Louis Jacob, the concession man, was there. His name appeared on the Building Committee. So did the name of Larkin Maloney, a Toronto construction man, who is interested in the Maple Leafs.

"Arthur Wirtz, partner of Sonja Hente and operator of Chicago Stadium, was listed on this committee and so was George McNamee Jr., 28-year-old son of the famous hockey star, now a wealthy Toronto resident.

"Head of the committee was Louis Richter, the Cincinnati concrete mixer.

"Three others listed as members of the board of directors, were Gilbert LaBino and Charles Hemstedt of Toronto, and Richard Barrett, lawyer in the office of Mr. Sawyer.

"There was also a Mr. Harold Ballard on the scene. He was identified as a sort of amateur hockey czar from Toronto.

"Sometime during the gathering it was announced by Mr. Sawyer that Cincinnati Gardens, Inc., hoped to announce its selection of a site by the end of February and start construction as soon thereafter as possible.

"There was no reason to doubt what he said."

Chicago Wins From Leafs 5-4
