Legislative Summary

(Continued From Page One)

the bill for the protection of the children of unmarried parents was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Hon Mr Prowse the bill to incorporate the Southern Rural Telephone Company was read a third time and passed. On motion of Hon. Mr. Stewart the Land Assessment Act 1924 was read a third time. The House then divided on the motion that the bill do now pass-5 yeas to 21 nays. The bill passed.

The House then resumed consideration of supply. Mr. Saunders continued his speech in reply to the Budget. First of all, he recapitulated the points he referred to last evening, payment of \$2,000 to the Lieutenant Governor, the enactment of two tax acts instead of one, paying all kinds of bills to the expenditures of the year and falling to collect the revenues. Between the two years 1922 and 1923 the difference in expenditures and revenue amounts to \$182,379.00, proving clearly that large sums of money in excess of requirements were paid, while the revenue was not fully collected. The sum of \$3,500 paid in by the Prohibition commissioners in 1923 was not credited to that year. By the late administration not one dollar was expended, improperly, Ex-Premier Bell stood on the lid of the treasury. Yet it was stated that the late government drifted behind to the extent of \$100,000 a year. The late government made good roads and the present government promise to do the same thing; if they fulfill that promise they must of necessity increase the liabilities of the Province just as the late government did. Mr. Saunders admitted that the government had repealed the poll tax. But, he said, they are going to put on a gasoline tax. The farmers of this country will not stand for such a tax. He would oppose it. Why should the farmers and fishermen be taxed for the gasoline they use. It is a most unfair and unjust tax. The Tax Act of the late government was in every respect a failure. The present government denounced it when in Opposition, now they are adopting it. They denounced the road-making of the late government; now they are about to carry on the good work. They are going to do the very same thing as the late administration did. The idea of funding the auto tax was a splendid idea. Perhaps they will adopt that also. That is the proper principle, and he hoped that the government would adopt it too. Mr. Saunders referred to the potato industry, and claimed that the late commissioner Mr. Lea should get credit for the improved conditions in which it is carried on. He agreed with the Premier that there can be much money saved in respect to Falconwood Asylum. There should be fewer free patients and there should be the closest economy in the management of that institution. He said that it would be lamentable if the Agricultural School should be done away. He thought that the teachers were not too highly paid. Their work was as important as that of the members of the government who receive salary. It would be better to cut the membership of the Legislature down a half, and he suggested that this should be done rather than the Agricultural and Technical should be done away. That is a most important institution. He expressed the hope that it would be continued. In conclusion he strongly denounced the government for not having appointed returned soldiers to office and for having dismissed returned soldiers from office. If he were Premier every single man in the building would be a returned soldier.
