 BOARD OF TRADE MEETING

 America, that have made the greatest success in oyster culture, are those that sold the areas outright.

I have no fault to find with the Government for giving the first preference to small holdings to the people of the Province. If a man wants one acre or five acres, he should have a right to a grant, but this should not prevent the granting of areas of a thousand or more acres to those who have capital to develop them, and will give a reasonable guarantee that they will make them productive within a reasonable time; and this should be one of the conditions of all grants, whether large or small. Do not make Provincial Government revenue the first consideration. Establish the industry, the revenue will follow.

The Premier receives more consideration from the Federal Government. A move in the right direction would be to separate the Fisheries from the Marine, creating a Department of Fisheries, with a minister at its head. The members of the Official Staff, both inside and outside, of that Department, should possess a special knowledge and fitness to perform the various duties assigned to them. A generous grant should be voted by Parliament to carry on the work of the Department, which should be largely educational.

It should be operated on the lines of the Agricultural Department, and with the same ends in view. Large sums of money have been spent by the Agricultural Department in the past educating the farmers, and highly beneficial results have accrued. No less than ten million dollars is placed in the estimates this year for the Department of Agriculture, to enable it to carry on the work of agricultural education, and the furtherance of the agricultural interests in Canada.

What the Agricultural Department has done for agriculture, the Department of Fisheries may do for the Fisheries. The Agricultural Department is, I believe, the best organized, and the most useful of the Government Departments; the Fisheries, as at present constituted, to say the least, falls far short of the requirements. Reconstruct it, place it in the hands of scientific and practical men, and you make it one of the most important and most beneficial Departments of the Government. It is only necessary to see what the German Government has done in fishery development within the last few years, to appreciate what may be done by Government assistance in the Atlantic fisheries of Canada.

The Premier, in his address already referred to, said that we have amongst us, a maximum of pessimists, with a minimum of optimists, and defined the distinction somewhat along these lines: the pessimist is suspicious, distrustful, and selfish, attributing every effort made for progress and improvement, to ulterior motives. If all is not coming his way, he does not want industry started at all. While preaching against monopoly, he is the greatest of all monopolists. The optimist on the other hand, is trustful and trusting, hopeful and confident, full of courage and enterprise, and is willing to share something with the other fellow.

What we want here is the optimist. We want a change in thought as well as a change in methods. Bacon, over 300 years ago, laid down this axiom in political economy: "A business, to be prosperous and permanent, must be conducted to the mutual benefit and advantage of every person participating in it." Dr. Adam Smith, 150 years later, repeats this, and it is just as applicable today as it ever was. The days of all for me, and nothing for you, have passed, happily, never to return, and the communities that have made the greatest economic progress, are those who have realized this fact.

We are entering upon a new era. The installing of the car ferry and the standardizing of the Prince Edward Island Railway will make an integral portion of the transportation system of Canada. The rapidly increasing population of Canada both urban and rural opens up great possibilities for industries producing food products. We have the raw material. I said in these rooms before, and I now repeat it, that Prince Edward Island can never enjoy its full measure of prosperity until its products may be landed on cars at every railway station, and shipped by one continuous haul without handling, to their final destination. We are within reasonable distance of the

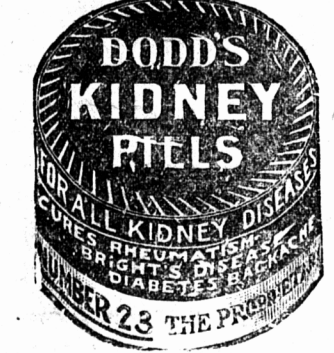
