NEGHELLI TAKEN BY ITALIANS

Il Duce Wires Con-
gratulations to The
Commander of
Southern Army.

ROME, Jan. 22—Italy reported the capture of the important town of Neghelli in Southern Ethiopia today and an "offensive" in the north.

An official dispatch from East Africa said Neghelli, capital of Galla Borana and 380 kilometres (236 miles) northwest of Dolo, had been taken "in a brilliant and rapid action."

Premier Mussolini cabled congratulations to General Rudiofo Graziani, in charge of the southern army.

A communique said the Northern army under Marshal Pietro Badoglio had pushed forward in the Tembien area. This action was called an "offensive" but, whether it meant a general advance or a "mopping up" operation was not disclosed.

In his message to General Graziani, Il Duce said: "The victory won over Ras Desta Demtu makes Italians proud. While expressing my pleasure to you, I also send praise to the officers and troops, Italians and native who have given proof of their brilliant courage and endurance during the operations."

"I am sure your leadership will bring the Italian and native troops further victories."

"But in Addis Ababa the government received assurances from Ras Desta Demtu, son-in-law of Emperor Haile Selassie and commander in the south, that his armies have not been defeated."

"It is absolutely untrue that I have been defeated," he said in re-

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Royal Family Re-united In Sorrow At Sandringham

SANDRINGHAM, England, Jan. 22—Edward VIII and his brothers, the Dukes of York and Gloucester, walked tonight to Sandringham, little parish church to kneel before the oaken coffin of their father.

It was the last night for the newly proclaimed Sovereign to be alone with his sire in the candle lit chapel where the late King so often worshipped.

Tomorrow the body will be taken to London for all the panoply of a state funeral.

The reverent visit of the dead King's sons followed quickly upon their simple homcoming to Sandringham House from London, where Edward was today publicly proclaimed King.

Family Circle Complete

The arrival of the Duchess of York and the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester, for the first time since prior to the King's fatal illness, completed the family circle here. Both Gloucester and the Duchess of York had been ill themselves.

Soon after the great gates of Sandringham House closed on the bereaved family, the new King caused a wreath to be placed in the chancel of the church, alongside the bier.

The simple coffin itself, inscribed merely: "George Frederick Ernest Albert Windsor, 1865-1936," still was decked with a single white floral piece, although the porch of the chapel was banked with blossoms brought by the sorrowing villagers who, during their final tributes, were permitted to pay their final tributes.

So many came during the day that police directed them in a line four deep. It stretched around the old moss-covered walls of the church toward the Norfolk gate, a quarter of a mile away.

Poignant scenes were enacted as old men, women and children, cripples and invalids, filed or were taken past for a bow before the flag-draped coffin.

Tomorrow the King's sons will walk behind the bier on its journey to the railway station. Queen Mary, her daughter and her daughters-in-law will follow in landaus.

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POWERS RALLY TO LEAGUE COVENANT

Multi-Lateral Medi-
terranean Assist-
ance Pact Signed.

GENEVA, Jan. 22—Great Britain, in the face of an Italian protest, officially informed the League of Nations today that a multi-lateral Mediterranean mutual assistance pact has been concluded.

Simultaneously the League's sanctions committee of 18 agreed to create a special experts committee to determine the practicability of an oil embargo against Italy—a move which, League officials said, lessened the likelihood of such a sanction.

The British memorandum, announced formally by the League, disclosed Britain, France, Turkey, Greece and Yugoslavia had agreed finally to aid each other if Italy attacks any one of them.

Later, Czechoslovakia and Rumania approved Yugoslavia's entrance into the pact, thus enlarging the arrangement to include, in effect, seven powers.

Responses from the other nations, the British memorandum said, left no doubt that they are ready faithfully to apply their obligations under the League Covenant as a result of sanctions taken against Italy.

Conversations between the general staffs of Great Britain and France, the memorandum asserted, did not touch upon the situation along the Franco-German borders, but "have been confined entirely to joint action in the event of hostilities in the Mediterranean, arising out of the application of sanctions."

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Age Old Pageantry Features Formal Proclamation

Traditional Ceremonies Carried
Out In London. Huge Crowds
Witness Pageantry.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—Amid mediaeval pageantry Edward VIII was proclaimed King today and began the 39th reign since the Norman conquest.

The 41-year-old bachelor, with a new solemnity because of his responsibilities, plunged into the affairs of state. He conferred with Prime Minister Baldwin and then sadly returned to Sandringham.

There his dead father, George V attended by simple country folk, rests in the little parish church. Tomorrow his body will be brought to London by special train, arriving at 2:45 p. m. It will lie in state in Westminster Hall until Monday night. Burial preceded by a state funeral procession will take place Tuesday at Windsor.

PUBLICLY PROCLAIMED

From the balcony of St. James' Palace, at Charing Cross, again at Temple Bar, and finally at the Royal Exchange, in the heart of the city of London, the new King was publicly proclaimed. Ten thousand troops lined the streets while picturesque trumpeters sounded a fan-fare and a 41-gun salute boomed in the honor of the man who symbolizes Imperial unity.

And the words of the ancient proclamation were carried throughout the mighty Empire, embracing every continent, by wireless—a modern touch to the picturesque proceedings. Many of Edwards' 500,000,000 new subjects heard them.

BODY TO BE TAKEN TO LONDON

The bereaved Royal Family circle, except for the grandchildren, Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret, was completed at Sandringham tonight with the arrival of the newly-proclaimed King and other members of the family. Tomorrow Edward VIII, accompanied by his three brothers, will walk behind a gun-carriage bearing his father to Wolferton Station near Sandringham. From there the funeral train will steam out at noon. The coffin will rest in a coach painted in black and purple. The train will be pulled by the "King George V," an express engine.

Arrangements have been made for a million members of the public to pass the catafalque during the lying in state at Westminster Hall.

Four Kings Will Attend Funeral

Previous to King Carol's announcement it was learned three Kings and one Queen would attend the funeral. They are: Leopold, King of the Belgians; King Haakon VII of Norway and Queen Maud, sister of the late King George V, and Christian X, King of Denmark.

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Will Broadcast King's Funeral

OTTAWA, Jan. 22—The Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission announced today it would broadcast over its national network next Tuesday funeral services for the late King George.

The services will be broadcast by short wave from the British Broadcasting Corporation's Daventry station, picked up by the commission's short-wave receiving station here and rebroadcast over the network.

Officials were unable at the moment to give times of the broadcast.

Bonus Bill Goes To White House

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22—An over-powering House majority today sped a bond payment bonus bill to the White House, handing to President Roosevelt the politically delicate problem of deciding within 10 days whether to let the legislation become law or risk the overriding of a veto.

For 3,500,000 Great War veterans, enactment will mean cash for their adjusted service certificates nine years ahead of the present maturity date. For the government, it will pose the question of raising at least \$1,000,000,000 at once and \$2,491,000,000 eventually.

Hell Freezes Over

HELL, Mich., Jan. 22—Hell was frozen over tonight.

The 50 year old village, now almost abandoned, was under six inches of snow with the remainder of Livingston County, and a heavy coating of ice covered the dam and ponds of Reeves mill, about which the life of the community once gravitated.
