Hall on Tuesday evening for the purpose of discussing the advisability of the town acquiring or renting land from Mr. Samuel Cannon for use as an airport. Mayor Lidstone presided. Mr. H. T. Begg, chairman of the committee appointed to look into the matter at a previous meeting, stated that the committee had received a report from Mr. Irving to the effect that the proposed field was the most suitable for an airport that he had come across in eastern Canada. Mr. Flemming, pilot of the airmail plane, also expressed the same opinion. In view of this they had obtained an agreement from Mr. Samuel Cannon, in writing, of which the following are the essential features:—Mr. Cannon agrees to permit the Town of Summerside the use of part of his property at the north end of the town as a landing field for aeroplanes until June 1st, 1930, at a rental of \$25 with an additional \$25 for damages. For the use of lot No. 1 for one year \$350 and for the use of lot No. 2 for one year \$250 until June 1931. For a period of five, ten or fifteen years, lot 1, \$300 and lot 2, \$200 per year. The combined lots would make a standard landing field, could be obtained for the yearly sum of \$500. Three months notice to be given to Mr. Cannon should the town wish to cancel the agreement. Notice is not necessary if land is only used until June 1st. That the town has the privilege of removing any fences or doing any necessary leveling or grading required for the construction of an airport or for the betterment of the ground for air port purposes. Also the erection of any buildings considered necessary. Provided that any fences, etc., are replaced and the land returned in a titable condition at the termination of the lease. His Worship Mayor Lidstone felt that it was of vast importance that this matter of establishing an airport at Summerside should receive very careful consideration from the people, for although at the present time there did not appear to be very much need of such a thing it could not be denied that it would be a necessity in a very short time if Summerside wanted to keep abreast of the times. The Town Council, however, had no authority to act on such a matter as this unless the people were unanimously in favor of the idea. Several of the citizens present expressed themselves as in favor of the movement. Mr. Begg, speaking on behalf of the Board of Trade, said that they would endorse anything that the Town Council did in the matter. In view of a proposed passenger service between Boston and Nova Scotia, which would be extended to the Island if there were suitable landing places it was important that the matter should be thoroughly looked into. The prices asked for the field were considered by all present as being very reasonable. Mr. B. W. Robinson, pointed out the advisability of purchasing the land outright and considered it would be a sound investment. It was agreed that the Town should be given the opportunity of purchasing the land. Mr. L. M. McNeill, member of the Town Council, stated that the Council as a whole were in favor of an air port for Summerside. They felt that at the present time only a few would be benefited by the proposal but that the future had to be considered. He illustrated the city of Moncton, where the citizens were behind the move and had helped considerably to provide the expenses. It was the general opinion of those present that the Town should start in a small way, see how the matter progressed but that the opportunity of a natural field at small cost should not be lost. Others making constructive remarks were Messrs. C. R. Rogers, Vincent Harrington, P. G. Clark and M. L. F. McKensie. The meeting was adjourned to a future date.—S.
