Victory Loan as An Investment

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.—Owing to the decline in foreign exchange the income return obtainable on high-grade securities has risen substantially, and it has therefore been decided to adjust the prices of Canadian Government Victory Bonds so that the investment returns from these securities will be increased accordingly, says a statement issued tonight. This is in line with the policy followed from the beginning of the war of making the Canadian Government securities the most attractive investments obtainable in Canada. The prices for the various maturities from Monday morning, the 23rd instant, as announced by the Victory Loan Special Committee, will be as follows:

DRUGS SEIZED BY THE POLICE IN VANCOUVER.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 23.—Drugs, the wholesale value of which is estimated at \$20,000 were seized by the police here last evening in the house of a Chinese, known as James J. Wing, or Chanchin. Letters were also found from Spokane, Seattle, Butte, Tacoma and Denver requesting shipments at prices varying from \$75 to \$80 an ounce. Diamonds, rings, watches and expensive furs, presumably bartered for drugs were also discovered.

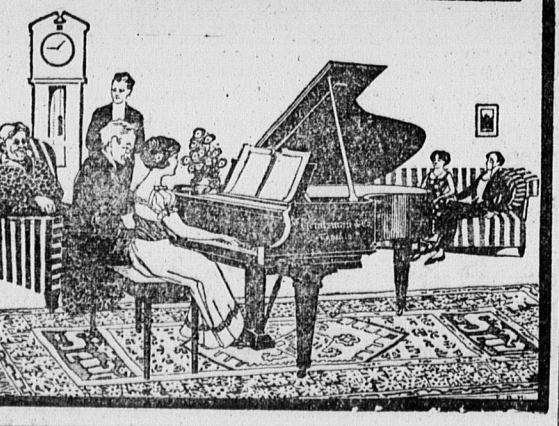
