"LOVE LETTERS" STARS NEWEST ROMANTIC TEAM

A new romantic team has come to life on the screen. Although Jennifer Jones and Joseph Cotten previously appeared together in "Since You Went Away," the latest Hal Wallis production, "Love Letters," stars them in a tender love story which marks Jennifer's first adult role. Now featured at the Prince Edward Theatre, "Love Letters" also includes Ann Richard, Cecil Kellaway, Gladys Cooper and Robert Sully in their parts.

From everything we have heard, the Cotten-Jones combo is truly an unbeatable one for there is just enough similarity and dissimilarity of personalities to make this a workable, but interesting screen partnership. Cotten is poised, sophisticated and mature. He knows how to impart added intensity to an emotion by skillfully underplaying it. Jennifer also knows how to do this, but there is something appealingly un-tutored in her manner. She is completely unaffected, sincere, though her ingenuousness is tempered by an alert intelligence. She is a half-woman, half-child and that is the essence of her distinctive charm. Both Jennifer Jones and Joseph Cotten are unusual types, quite different from the accepted Hollywood formula.

A psychological romantic drama, "Love Letters" is the story of two people brought together by a collection of letters actually written by one of the protagonists. The letters leave murder and romance in their wake and inspire one of the strangest love stories some have ever seen. Crop Report

WINNIPEG, Man., May 10 — With but few exceptions, seeding has progressed rapidly throughout the prairie provinces during the past week. Spring operations are further advanced in eastern and southern sections of Manitoba and Saskatchewan, but good progress is being made elsewhere with only northern Manitoba reporting some delay due to snow and rain over the weekend. High winds in Saskatchewan and Alberta have caused some soil drifting damage, and in moisture deficiency areas have dried out the top soil, leading to a greater unweary germination. Some farmers in these sections are withholding seeding operations waiting for rain, according to the weekly crop report of the Department of Agriculture of the Canadian National Railways.

A series of short, but lively discussions by volunteer members was held on subjects of local importance: the alleged bottleneck in the eastern New England; the question of the R. C. M. P. polling the City, and the proposed Brighton Bridge project, with the general opinion of the Club in favour of the latter two proposals. Past-President Hazen Wigmore was welcomed back to the Club after a number of weeks' illness. Mr. Scott Elliott of Saint John was a guest.

Delmarva Hatchery Eggs

Resumption of shipments this summer looks probable. The first consignment has been received from F. G. Ward, Poultry Marketing & Production Services. It would appear that the time were opportune to re-open the question of the shipment of hatching eggs to Delmarva. In the past, there has been quite an acute demand from that area for baby chicks in the eastern New England. This has resulted from the rapid rise in prices for broilers in that district. In last January, prices for live broilers reached a low point of around 17 to 20 cents per lb. The situation was discouraging, however, in February prices improved and by March they came up to 25 cents. In April reached the ceiling price of 31 cents. Since then the demand has raised the price of live broilers anywhere from 32 to 40 cents, 34, 35 and 36 being probably the prevailing prices. Indications are that the demand will continue throughout the summer.

It appears that the demand for baby chicks will be brisk throughout the summer months and the outlook is such that it might well be explored before brooding flocks are disbanded. We are already corresponding with a Delmarva Hatchery Executive re renewed shipments.

MADE TRIP FOR BRIDE RETURNS WITH CATTLE

ADELAIDE, Australia, May 10 (CP)—A returned soldier who made a special trip to England to bring back his bride returned to Australia without his wife but with four prize bulls and four heifers. He is H.A. Burns of Adelaide. Burns met his wife while serving in England in 1940. He returned to Australia believing that she would follow soon after. He waited a year and then went back to England. In England he found after waiting some months, that he could not get passage to Australia for either his wife or himself. Finally, a single passage on a ship was offered on the condition that he would export a consignment of cattle during the trip.

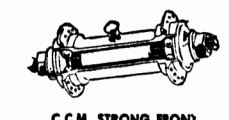

LEGISLATORS GET WEEKLY PENSIONS SYDNEY, Australia, May 8 (CP)—Members of the New South Wales Legislative Assembly who have served more than 16 years in the state parliament will get a pension of about \$22 a week under a plan just approved. Members with less than 15 years' service but who have served in three different legislatures will receive \$18 weekly under the plan drawn up to provide for members who retire or suffer election defeats. To enjoy the pension benefit members will have to pay \$6.40 a week into a special fund. Labor party members of the State House for several years have contributed about \$7 each every month to what they call a "Waratah Fund" divided after elections among those who failed to be re-elected. On one occasion, a member by the name of Tom Keegan, only Labor member not returned to his seat in state elections, pocketed the complete fund of something like \$2,000. When the Labor party has had bad election times, defeated members have drawn as little as \$50 apiece from the fund. "Waratah" is the name of a native Australian flower which thrives in New South Wales.
