U. S. To Control Crop Program WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—(CP)—The United States Administration set in motion machinery to carry out the gigantic crop control program signed into law today by President Roosevelt.

Canadian Canal Traffic Up OTTAWA, Feb. 17.—In these days when so much stress is placed upon speed in transportation it is interesting to note that waterborne traffic in Canada is on the increase. A new high record was established when traffic through the Welland Ship Canal which connects Lake Erie with Lake Ontario and over comes the drop at Niagara Falls, amounted to 1,750,000 tons during 1937 season of navigation compared with 1,443,803 tons in the previous season. The 1937 freight movement included 4,058, 068 tons of coal, 1,872,242 tons of wheat, 923,302 tons of grain, oilseeds, petroleum and other oils, 900,180 tons of iron ore, 351,354 tons of corn, 495,699 tons of pulpwood, and numerous other commodities. Traffic in the St. Lawrence canals reached a total of 9,973,302 tons during 1937 compared with 8,288,524 in 1936.

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
