Island, the bonus to be paid for three years to enable the industry to get a fair start. The committee will report on Thursday next. The very best of order prevailed throughout, not so much as a whisper being heard during the hour and a quarter occupied in the delivery of lecture. Sixty-five views of places of interest in Palestine were thrown on the canvas and contributed immensely to the enjoyment of the lecture.

SENTNER McLEOD & Co. have received a letter from their milliner Miss Murnyan, now in New York "visiting the grand millinery openings which are taking place this week. She states that large turbans draped in all conceivable ways are much shown, and everything is the low draped effect. The larger hat of various designs, as plaques with the smallest round crowns almost represent a cone, and these are trimmed with lots of flowers and ribbon rosetts and soft flat bows of wide ribbon. Castor, tuscany, gold, turquoise, black and white seem to be shown everywhere. Everything has a dash of gold in it, even flowers have tinsel on them. Lace is also shown on many hats, while white and black velvet ribbon holds a place at the fore. Buckles are very much used from six to ten inches long. Roses and foliage seem to lead in flowers. Fruit is much used also. Whole hats made of meline or tulle-racket pattern are new and very pretty. Horse hair braids about an inch wide ruffled and sewn on a light foundation, "plague style," then shaped and trimmed with flowers, quills, ribbons, &c., are very handsome. Everywhere you go you see those plague effects. Johnstone's on Broadway make an elegant showing, and they get elegant prices; \$25 is a common price for some of their hats. She also states that she has bought everything that is new, and that the ladies of Charlottetown will be able to procure the latest New York styles this season. Miss Murnyan will also visit Boston and Toronto on her way back.

THE Episcopalians of Crapaud have let the contract for erecting a new church edifice to Messrs. Haslam Brothers of Victoria. The building is to be completed by July 1902 at a cost of about \$3,500. The following are the building committee: Messrs. William Collet, Crisp Moore, Robert Moore, Neil Lowther, Wm. McDonald, Wm. D. Sherren, Thomas Rogerson and C. C. McIntosh. The parishes of Crapaud and Springfield, vacant since the departure of Rev. J. M. Forbes, will have the services of their new Rector, Rev. Charles Cumming, late of Port Gravelle N. S. on and after Sunday, March 21. Rev. Mr. Cumming is very highly spoken of.

AN exchange tells that immediately after the late Queen's death a peeress telegraphed to Germany for 200 ermine skins with which to line her cloak for the opening of Parliament. All peeresses have to wear white gowns at the coronation, which are usually of satin trimmed with gold, the train being ruby velvet bordered with ermine. The train of a duchess is three yards on the ground, that of a marchioness two yards and a half, of a countess two yards, of a viscountess one yard and a half, and of a baron's wife one yard. It is easy to see, then, that a great many weasels will be required to meet the demand, and they must be all killed in winter, while the fur is white.

For the third time in two years the family of Mrs. Thos. Mayne, Springfield, are mourning the loss of a beloved member. First a beloved daughter was called away. Then the father, Mr. Thos. Mayne, a man of sterling character and very highly respected. Now another daughter has been called to her heavenly reward. The deceased, Katie Mayne, was only in her 17th year and a few months ago was the picture of good health. Good hopes were entertained for her recovery until a few weeks ago, and her death took place on Monday, March 4th. Her amiable and quiet disposition made her a favorite with all and her early death has caused universal mourning and sympathy for the bereaved family. Her funeral took place on Tuesday to the Presbyterian Cemetery at Springfield, Rev. Mr. Sterling officiating, and the procession of over 100 sleights testified the great esteem in which she was held.—Com.

Owing largely no doubt to the stormy weather there was not a large audience in Victoria rink on Saturday night to witness the game between the Unions of Crapaud and the Mutuals, an aggregation from the city. The ice notwithstanding the soft weather, was in perfect condition and the game in the first half was very slow and one sided. The score at half time stood 5-2 in favor of the Unions, and at the finish was 11-5 in their favor. The second half was much faster. There was considerable enthusiasm manifested on both sides. After the match an hour's skating by the spectators was indulged in. There were about 20 persons up from Charlottetown. The rink, which has recently been fitted with acetylene gas, is one of the best lighted rinks on the Island. Mr. W. N. Lee, of Victoria, refereed the game to the satisfaction of all concerned. The umpires were Messrs. Riggs of Charlottetown, and W. Snow of Victoria. Messrs. H. Mabon of the city and Dr. Jardine of Victoria, acted as time-keepers. The Crapaud team expressed a wish to play a return match in the Hillsboro rink, Charlottetown.
