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GANDHI GIVES ENGLAND TILL THURSDAY

Mahatma Has Abandoned Hope of Independence For India—Gov't. Has Until 19th For Change of Heart.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Mahatma Gandhi repudiated the communal agreement between Moslems and smaller Indian minorities today and announced that on Thursday he intends to leave London because he has abandoned all hope of obtaining independence for India.

At a meeting of the minorities committee of the round-table conference Mr. Gandhi took sharp issue with Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald, who presided. The Nationalist leader expressed astonishment that the Prime Minister should have said the minorities agreement, reached yesterday, was acceptable to 46 per cent of India's population.

Asserting that his Nationalists are at least 85 per cent of India, the Mahatma declared he would renew the anti-British campaign rather than permit an arrangement under which the "untouchables" would remain a separate caste. When the meeting was over Mr. Gandhi told questioners that only a drastic change in the Government's attitude toward the Nationalists could avert a return of chaos and tragedy in India.

The Government has until Thursday for a change of heart, he said. On Thursday he plans to go to Paris to make an address. Later he will go to Geneva to discuss measures for relieving the world's woes.

He is survived by a wife and two children.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 12.—The campaign between the police committee of the Halifax City Council, and W. E. Palmer, chief of the force, was still a no-decision contest tonight. The committee, which includes Mayor George Ritchie and Aldermen W. E. Donovan and Russell McInnes, seeks to remove Chief Palmer from the position. The chief refuses to resign. The city solicitor believes only the City Council as a whole can dismiss or hire a chief.

LAVAL FAVORS YOUNG PLAN

PARIS, Nov. 13. (A.P.)—Premier Pierre Laval, conferring with the foreign and finance committees of the Chamber of Deputies, said tonight he had not bound himself on reparations in his talks with President Hoover, but had left the final decision to the French Parliament. He told the U. S. President, he said, that the Hoover moratorium was not as beneficial as would be a return under the Young plan. There was no new credits to offer Germany at this time, he added, and France would rather wait until experts have passed on Germany's ability to pay before the matter is reconsidered.

COMMUNISTS SENTENCED TO PENITENTIARY

Seven of the Eight Convicted Men Will Be Deported At The Expiration of Their Sentences.

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 13.—The law said the final word in the case of Rex vs. Tim Buck, et al, today. In ringing tones, Mr. Justice Wright concluded a trial which had attracted world-wide interest by sentencing seven Communists to terms of five and two years, concurrent, on three charges, and another to a term of two years and one year, also concurrent, on similar charges.

The men, all members of the Communist Party of Canada, had been tried and found guilty on charges of being members of an unlawful association, acting as members of such an association, and with being parties to a seditious conspiracy. Similar charges had never before been entered against such an organization—the party, as well as its members, was on trial. Seven of the eight men will be deported at the expiration of their sentences; all property of the communist party in Canada will revert to the Crown. The lone man who will be permitted to remain in Canada is Malcolm L. Bruce, who was born here. The others were born in various other parts of the world, although all had lived in this country for many years. Under a section of the Immigration Act, however, they can lose their citizenship for seditious acts. The eight men are: Tim Buck, leader of the party in Canada; Tom Ewen, John Boychuk, Amos T. Hill, Matthew Popovitch, Bruce Samuel Cohen and Thomas Cacle. It was Cacle who received the two and one year sentence. All the others will serve five years. The men who were sentenced today will probably remain in the city jail for some days before being taken to the penitentiary to commence their long terms.

GRAIN SAMPLES FOR EUROPE

WINNIPEG, Man., Nov. 13.—Tiny sample sacks of grain—silent salesmen from the wheat fields of Western Canada—today are Europe bound, seeking to preserve and increase Canada's position in the wheat markets of the world. The shipment was arranged by the Board of Grain Commissioners and the small bags are on their way to grain exchanges and grain trade associations in Great Britain and France, Belgium, Holland, Germany and Italy.

DUCKS SWARM IN THE WEST

CALGARY, Alta., Nov. 13.—Shortage of ducks does not exist in Northern Alberta, according to word reaching here. Ducks are to be seen rising in clouds, it is said by those who have travelled the territory to the north recently. Trains and road vehicles drive swarms of the ducks into the air from the streams and rivers, when they speed by. Settlers state that the birds are more numerous than last year. Aeroplane pilots say they can be seen in nearly every plough. Plentiful rain in the North it is said, accounts for the numbers of birds. Dry weather in the South accounts for the large numbers in the North.

Main Shops Of C.P.R. To Reopen

An Indication Of Better Times Ahead—Over 12,000 Men Will Return To Work On Tuesday Next.

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 13. (By the Canadian Press)—The main shops of the Canadian Pacific Railway in various Canadian cities will be reopened Tuesday, November 17, it was announced. The shops were closed in September as an economy measure.

Rolling Mills Will Resume Work In Amherst

Bold Robbery Of Toronto Bank

They secured approximately \$2,000. Few people were in the neighborhood at the time. The provincial police were notified by telephone as soon as the men departed.

Will Hang For Double Murder

THREE RIVERS, Que., Nov. 13.—Convicted of the double murder of Jean Baptiste Bellerose, 70-year old farmer, and his niece Antoinette, Joseph Lebel, alias Michaud, was this afternoon sentenced to hang February 5. The assizes jury deliberated five minutes before reaching a verdict of guilty against the young farm hand.

WOULD SETTLE DOCK STRIKE

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 13.—Attorney Thomas A. Mahoney, legal representative of the Boston District Council of the International Longshoremen's Association, today proposed to steamship officials that an arbitral committee be formed to attempt settlement of the Boston dock strike.

More than 1,000 longshoremen walked out five weeks ago after a disagreement with steamship officials concerning sling loads and meal hours. Reports of a plan to place the port on an open shop basis were denied by steamship officials.
