PROVINCIAL PROHIBITION.

The Temperance Alliance of Charlottetown and the Provincial Alliance are to be congratulated upon the effect of the resolutions adopted at their recent annual meetings. Their condemnation of the existing system by which a Provincial revenue is derived from licenses to sell liquors, and their advocacy of the passage of a Provincial Prohibitory Law have been accepted by the Patriot newspaper as expressing the will of the temperance people of the Island and as of weight in determining the course of legislation in the future. We regard this as a matter of great importance, as the Patriot is recognized to be the leading exponent of Liberal opinion here.

The Examiner stands opposed to Provincial Prohibition for the assigned reasons that it is not what the people voted for in the plebiscite, will not stop the importation of liquors and might operate to excuse the federal authorities from giving us National Prohibition. But it is well known that in the Conservative party, for which the Examiner speaks, there are many temperance men who, while preferring National Prohibition, and looking thereto as the ultimate goal, would be pleased to see a Provincial Prohibitory Law enacted in the mean time. And it will be remembered that the majority of the opposition voted against the License Bill at the last session of the legislature.

The situation therefore is considerably cleared. The Opposition cannot be expected to oppose the repeal of the measure whose enactment they voted against last year. While there may not be the same unanimity in the House in supporting a measure to give Provincial Prohibition, it might be expected to pass with a good majority. In view of the temperance sentiment among the majority of the electorate, comparatively few members, we would suppose, would venture to record their votes against it, especially as they must before long be called to account at a general election. Therefore we have reason to hope that the coming session may give us legislation more in accord with the prevailing public sentiment than what we have heretofore had.

A HINT TO THE POETS.

We clip the following from the Montreal Witness because it is entirely true and applicable to THE GUARDIAN and much of the poetry sent us for publication:—

The Witness receives a great deal of poetry which it does not print. This is sometimes due to bad syntax, bad measure and bad rhymes, sometimes to being out of date or getting so before it can be published, sometimes, though very seldom, indeed, to unworthy sentiments. There is, therefore, no need for verse with nothing in it.

VACCINATION.

Doctors State It is a Medical Delusion and Poisons the System.

TORONTO, April 16.—A large deputation waited on the Ontario Government to protest against compulsory vaccination. It included Messrs. J. D. Nasmith, Dr. Becker, Dr. Sparrow, Dr. Hardy, Dr. K. Richardson, Dr. Eleanor Lannox and a number of ladies. The deputation asks for the abolition of compulsory vaccination which is now the necessary preliminary to a child's admission to the public schools. The deputation objected altogether to the state enforcing vaccination. The operation, it was declared, simply poisoned the system, often producing tuberculosis, cancer and terrible incurable skin diseases. If state aid was abolished the people would look upon vaccination in an impartial way.

Dr. Becker held that vaccination was the most colossal medical delusion of the century. It was not a preventive of smallpox, but was productive of tuberculosis, cancer and other diseases. J. D. Nasmith said the recent epidemic at Toronto Junction had shown that the practice was useless, as most of those with the disease had been vaccinated at one time or another. Dr. Sparrow cited cases where terrible skin diseases had been communicated by vaccination.

Replying to the deputation, Premier Ross promised consideration and at his request was supplied with a lot of literature on the subject.
