Maine is well represented already with Mr. Monte Gerow's string of three in Allen A., Princess May, and Sandy Scott. This is Mr. Gerow's first visit to the Island and whether he captures any of the prizes or not the Island has captured him, by his grip in the hand shay you know that he has held the reins over some fast ones and by the look of his string they are among the fastest. Sandy Scott, you all want to look him over on the track, he will grip you at a pretty nice piece of horse flesh and he knows his "oats" and by his looks you don't need to hold a peck if it in front for him to win.

Billie Hood, of the Merritt Stable, owned by Mr. Adams, Halifax, has also a nice string in Plate Glass, Worldy Louise and Liza Todd. Plate Glass looks like a regular miler and is just as smooth. Bill McManus of Truro is here with two nice ones, Neshia who won at Summerside on Thursday last and Maud Axworthy. Both horses are in the pink and can be relied on to put up a horse race from wire to wire.

(Moody) Allen, Sydney, N. S., has over Celia Todd, you all know what the Todd horse can do well Celia is right up with the best. Just Tramp, well named, is owned by Mr. Cohen of Moncton, and from what we can learn he can step the oval with the best.

Wellington McNeill, Southport has that well known mare who has put up some nice racing on local tracks this season and who won her class at Summerside on Thursday, also Dixie Marne.

Aubrey Anna, owned by Dr. Heath McIntyre is also at the track and rearing to go, this mare will be well worth watching on the oval this week.

Mr. C. W. McKenzie, St. Stephen has Captain Mac and Katherine Claude two fast ones that will be heard from this week. Lambert Todd 2:02-1/4 is also quartered at the stables he is a free-for-all and there is no class for him, unless his owner takes him out for an airing to have a go at the track record.

Peter Conroy has Longset, who needs no introduction to horsemen or horse fanciers on P. E. Island, he will also have Dr. Dougan's mare, Marge Direct, direct from St. Stephen and Fredericton races, good second in 2:13. This two will make plenty of competition in every start they make.

Mr. W. T. Latta of River Herbert, N. S., has Bill L., a bay stallion by Aubrey, Bill L. has quite a few victories this season already, he is here alone from Mr. Latta's stables but will be an outstanding pacer on the track in his beautiful new flossy fall coat, he is the picture of a good race horse and will be making 'em step in the 2:22 and 2:30. Watch for him on the track.

With the above list and the ones to arrive from other Provinces and out of town today one of the finest if not the finest lot of race horses will be gathered together to give battle this week.

The Island Macs

The Macdonalds, especially the Catholic ones, have been several times of late in our columns. So as an interesting pendant to last week's story of MacDonalday and Liza Todd, Prince Edward Island last week: "In the early days you brought over 300 Macdonalds from the Isles. Three hundred Macdonalds are worth three thousand of any other men." Mr. Baldwin, by the way, has Macdonald blood, through his mother. As a matter of fact, P. E. I. is one of the most Catholic places on the Western Continent—readers will remember how the Catholic Highlanders refused to emigrate unless they could take their priest with them.

It is interesting to observe that of the sixty priests on Prince Edward Island to-day eleven are Macdonalds or MacDonalds, and among the others are such names as Campbell, McPherson, McAulay, McIntyre, and McLellan. Two Macdonalds have been Bishops of Charlottetown, the diocese which comprises P. E. I. and the Magdalen Islands. There are not many places in the Empire which have produced so many priests as has Prince Edward Island. Among its sons are Bishop F. C. Kelley, of Oklahoma, who founded the Catholic Church Extension Society. There was the late Mgr. Burke, who was for many years at the head of the Extension Society in Canada, and dozens more are distributed throughout the world. The population of Prince Edward Island was 88,615 at the 1821 census, and the American Official Directory claims that the Catholic population is 45,812.—London Universe.

Tunney To Give Up Ring For Platform CHICAGO, Sept. 24.—Gene Tunney will abandon the squared circle of pugilism for the lecture platform of North America's young manhood, former Governor James M. Cox, of Ohio, once a presidential candidate, said here today.

SHOOTING AFFRAY AT BEDEQUE.

Much interest was manifested in a case which came before Mr. Alex. Campbell, J. P., Summerside, on Wednesday morning. The case was the outcome of a shooting incident at Central Bedeque on Monday, Sept. 19th. It appears that Edward Burgoyne, a returned soldier of Found's Mills, went to the home of George Crossman at Central Bedeque, to see his wife, who was staying there.

It is alleged that Burgoyne carried a loaded rifle with him and that he made certain threats against his wife, who laid the information causing his arrest. Burgoyne, while conversing with his wife, received a charge from a gun in the left leg below the thigh and was in the Prince County Hospital having the shots extracted when the sheriff arrested him on Tuesday night on a warrant.

On Wednesday morning the case came up as stated and Mr. Heath Strong, K. C., attorney for the Prisoner took certain objections to the information laid. Mr. Thane Campbell the attorney for the prosecution thereupon applied to have the information amended which was granted, and the charge is now of "having an offensive weapon for a purpose dangerous to the public peace."

The attorney for the prisoner then asked, in view of the amendment, for an adjournment, which was granted to Wednesday, Sept. 28th, at 11 a. m., at the Court House in Summerside.

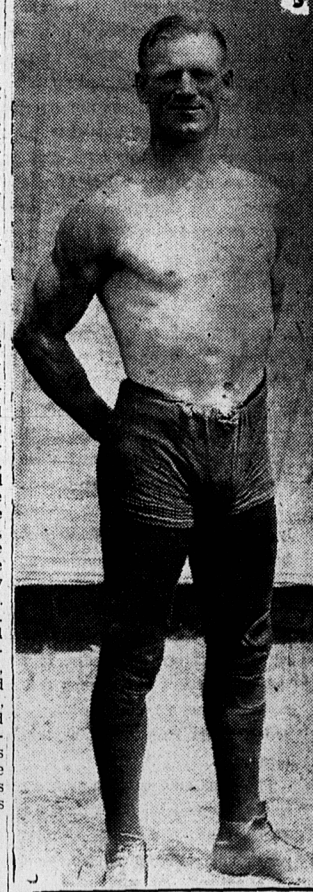
