**Livestock Market**

MONTREAL, July 9. — Cattle receipts 1,039. Market steady. The bulk of the cattle were common to medium cows and bologna bulls. There were no top steers and only a few good steers. The best brought from \$10.50 to \$11.00. Medium steers sold for \$10.00 to \$10.25 and common steers from \$8.00 up. Heifers sold from \$5.00 to \$10.00. Good cows brought from \$8.00 to \$8.50 and medium quality big bodied cows around \$7.00 to \$7.25. Common thin cows were from \$5.00 to \$7.00 with the bulk of sales around \$6.00 to \$6.25. Butcher steers, good \$10.50 to \$11.00, medium \$8.50 to \$9.00, common \$8.00 to \$8.25. Butcher cows good \$8.00 to \$8.50, medium \$7.00 to \$7.50, common \$5.50 to \$6.00. A few tops were sold up to \$15.50 and a few culls as low as \$12.00. Sheep were not wanted, ewes \$3.00 to \$6.50, lambs good \$15.00, common \$13.00 to \$14.50. Hog receipts 2,812. Packers were offering \$12.00 for hogs. Sales to local butchers were made up to \$12.50. Mixed lots containing heavies and odd light sows and averaging 250 pounds or more sold for \$12.00. Sows were from \$8.00 to \$10.00 with the bulk between \$8.50 and \$9.50.
