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A FOX TALK

Under the caption "Expert talk on the fox market" the last number of the Busy East published an article by Mr. Frederick L. Rogers of Summerside, which is reproduced below.

The Silver Fox market in Prince Edward Island is just now in a very active condition. Every day we hear of sales of foxes being closed at good prices, and there is at the moment very little first class stock left. Sales of young males at \$6,000 to \$8,000 each and of vixens at from \$8,000 to \$10,000 each have been recently reported. The market is also good for the 1914 product. We believe we are within the truth when we say that over 25 per cent. of the expectation has already been placed. The market opened at about \$2,000 per pair higher than a year ago with a much greater demand. Our largest customers, outside of local concerns are the people of Massachusetts and other near by States. So far, Montreal and Toronto, being immersed in real estate speculation, with most of their money tied up, have not invested to the extent that might otherwise be expected. When the financial depression is over the eyes of investors in Central Canada will certainly turn toward the P. E. I. fox industry. The most pleasing feature to be noted is that British investors—who are perhaps the most conservative of any—have become seriously impressed with the opportunities for the profitable employment of capital in this business.

A prominent manufacturer of Birmingham who recently visited the United States and Canada, heard of the industry and came immediately to P. E. I. to study it at first hand. The result of his investigation was that, before leaving for home he placed £5,000 sterling in a new Company which is being formed here. Quite a little of London money has also been sent over to be employed in securing 1914 young animals. This we believe, is just the beginning of a widespread interest in old England and it is easy to see that, with the immense amount of capital employed there in industries that pay but a small profit, once the attractive possibilities of fox farming become generally known, large investments will

be certain to be made. The fox business in P. E. I., is now very largely in the hands of men who are prominent in other lines of business, whereas a few years ago it was held by a few individual farmers. The large amount of money necessary to establish has made it impossible for individuals to own foxes outright, but the establishment of incorporated companies has made it easy for our people to become interested in the business. The investor can place his money in companies now with the full confidence that his affairs will be handled honestly and carefully. Of course there are a few companies looking for capital that the investor should be wary of but after all these are the small exception rather than the rule. We would suggest to our readers that when a fox proposition is placed before them, they make a rigid investigation into the character and standing of the men behind the scheme. If the men are alright the proposition is sure to be a fair one; if they are of the other kind the prospectus will certainly appear very enticing. The Company of which the writer is manager earned about 75 per cent. on its capital. Last month it paid a dividend of 50 per cent. and has added a large reserve to its capital, without having to resort to a re-valuation of its animals which are carried on its books at what they cost in 1911-12. Reports of the London fur sales of October, last are certainly very encouraging and seem to point to a realization of the prophecy we made in an article in your September number, viz., that fox fur might be counted on to advance in price. With a decline in the price of almost every other fur, owing, it is said, to distributed business and political conditions generally, and to large failures in the fur trade in central Europe particularly, Silver Fox actually advanced 10 per cent. above the extreme prices paid in March last; and the humble crowd or patch fox, so much despised by breeders of Silvers, has breeders so fashionable as a moderate priced fur as to bring two and a half times the figures realized last spring. Some furriers claim that "bat" furs are going off for awhile and point to the decline in mink and marten as evidence in this trend of fashion. The point is simply this, that the advance in fox furs is remarkable and seems to show a world wide interest in the glossy coat of the crafty Reynard. And Prince Edward Island is "producing the goods."

SAYS MONROE WAS AT A STANDSTILL

NEW YORK, Feb. 3—Captain E.E. Johnson of the old Dominion liner Monroe, which sank off the Virginia coast last week with a loss of forty-one lives, arrived here yesterday and was shown despatches quoting Captain Berry of the Nantucket, which rammed the Monroe, as saying the Monroe at the time of the collision was attempting to pass the Nantucket, starboard contrary to maritime regulations.

"I suppose Captain Berry's trying to save his ticket," said Johnson. "We were at a standstill when the Nantucket hit us. I think his report that the Nantucket's engines were reversed must be true, as the Nantucket backed away immediately we were hit."

"It was the last man to leave the Monroe, and I stepped directly from the deck into a lifeboat, as the port rail was then beneath the water. We rowed around for some time and picked up several persons. That is all I care to say."

MOORS SUSTAINED

TETUAN, Morocco, Feb. 3—The Moorish tribesman sustained a very heavy loss in a stubbornly contested battle with a column of Spanish troops on Friday at Beni-Salem, to the south of this town, while the Spanish forces also were severely stricken, losing four officers and 22 men killed and four officers and 113 men wounded.

When scouts brought in the information to headquarters that some thousands of Moorish tribesmen had taken up strong positions in the rocky ravines at Beni-Salem, the Spanish Commander-in-Chief ordered out a column composed of cavalry artillery and infantry to attack them. The battle began at an early hour and lasted almost all day, the Moors holding to their positions with great tenacity. They were, however, forced to retreat, leaving a large proportion of their numbers dead or wounded on the field.
