TWO LIQUOR SEIZURES.—  
News of the seizure by the Prohibi-  
tion officers on Saturday of 75  
gallons of rum at Borden and 155  
gallons on Brighton Road, created  
considerable excitement through-  
out the city yesterday. A third  
raid was made on Saturday night  
at a well known establishment at  
North River but no liquor was  
found. Saturday morning inspec-  
tors Barbour, Haywood and Brad-  
ley trailed a suspected motor car  
from Cardigan to Borden and  
made the seizure of 75 one gallon  
tins of rum about 7.45 p.m. as it  
was being loaded at Borden sta-  
tion for shipment to Moncton. The  
driver of the car, a Charlottetown  
man, was arrested and taken to  
Summerside where he appeared be-  
fore the Magistrate and was re-  
manded until Friday. He was re-  
leased upon the payment of a \$700  
bond and returned to Charlottes-  
town with the prohibition officers.  
Inspector Barbour declares that  
the car was specially fitted out for  
rum-running, with secret compart-  
ments. He had stopped the same  
car, he states about three weeks  
ago with a suspected rum load on  
the road near Rustico but the driv-  
er had managed to escape. The  
raid on the premises of a resident  
of Brighton Road was conducted  
by Inspectors Barbour, Haywood,  
Coyle and Bradley at about 4 p.m.  
Saturday. Fifteen ten gallon kegs  
were discovered neatly stowed  
away in the cellar and a few ad-  
ditional one gallon jars and this  
were afterwards found outside,  
under the verandah.

**MALABAR BLOWN UP**—The old schooner Malabar, which carried many cargoes from this port in years gone by and was recently a ter derelict, old age towed to Hazard's Cove just outside the harbor, and left stranded there on the sand flats, out of the way of shipping, is now no more! She was dynamited into kindling wood Saturday morning by Mr. Poland, the Government submarine engineer, and his assistant. It took six powerful charges to finish the job, for the old timbers hung together remarkably well. A representative of the Guardian accompanied the wrecking crew Saturday morning to Hazard's cove, where the Malabar was resting high out of the water. Access to the inside of the ship was an easy matter, and the charges of dynamite, about fifty pounds in all, were placed without difficulty in vital parts—between the keelsons, under the stern post, and under the keel amidships, on the port and starboard sides and under the forefoot and fired successively by means of an electric battery from a punt anchored about a hundred and fifty yards away. Even from this distance the concussion could be plainly felt and flying splinters fell nearby. The water was strewn with wreckage from the first explosion and when the job was finished all that was left of the Malabar will be drifting away with the next high tide.

**"WAR HORSE" TANK.**

The first tractor tank for the British army has been built by Vickers, Limited, of Sheffield and Barrow, England, says the Central News.

Workers have named it the new "artillery war horse," as it is capable of taking artillery into action in addition to being a self-contained fighting unit. The tank is mounted with guns and has a turret.

Its range is twice that of the earlier type of tank used in the war, and it has special features in the caterpillar and anti-jolt mountings.

The contract price is about £8,000 for each tank, and the first order is for twenty-three.

**SUGGESTIONS FOR THE LAUNDRY**

If one shaves or flakes bar soap at odd moments and so is assured of having a plentiful supply ready for wash-day, it will be a convenience very much appreciated on a busy morning.

Determine by experimenting the amount of soap to each tubful of clothes which gives the best results under the particular conditions you have to meet. Soap and trouble will be saved by using this amount regularly as a standard, increasing when necessary to provide for unusually soiled clothes, or decreasing when the washing is smaller than normally.

It is well to remember that most spots on fabrics are more easily seen before the fabric is wet than afterwards. Look over the clothes carefully when putting into the tub and give attention to bad grease spots or unusual soil of any kind at this time. Many a spot that might slip by unnoticed will thus be caught.

**ULSTER PREMIER TO SEE BALDWIN**

BELFAST, Nov. 3.—The Ulster Premier, Sir James Craig, is going to London tonight in response to an invitation from Premier Baldwin for a discussion of the question of the boundary between Northern and Southern Ireland, their conversation to be a preliminary to a conference planned for the New Year.

According to the Belfast Telegraph the conference, if it materializes, will be along the lines of the meeting of Sir James and Michael Collins in January, 1920, and will not be in the nature of a settlement through the boundary commission provided for under the treaty setting up the Free State.

**GIRL WHO CANNOT COOK.**

Accused to forbid the marriage of his daughter on the grounds that "she neglected her mother, and not interest herself in cooking, and does not even know how to purchase and cook a dinner" has been entered by a father in several London, England, register offices.

He also declares that she appears to be fond of dancing and pleasure.

The girl, who is 19, has, it is stated, been engaged for several months without her parents' consent to a commercial traveller whom she met in a dancing-hall. Her father has been unable to find that any notice of marriage has been given, but he fears that the couple will shortly attempt to be married.

A caveat which costs 5s., is a warning to those who have power to authorize or perform a marriage ceremony, and is used chiefly by parents or guardians who fear that a minor intends to get married secretly.
