**THE ICE BERG PROBLEM.**

WASHINGTON, June 1—An exhaustive study of the iceberg problem with a view to finding a method for determining the proximity of icebergs to ships will be conducted by three officers of the United States Bureau of Standards, who leave Philadelphia in the Scout Cruiser Chester next Sunday. The officials will take with them a large number of delicate instruments for measuring the temperature and other conditions in the water in the vicinity of icebergs.

W. T. Anderson, Morell, left Saturday morning on a business trip to Toronto.

G. A. W. Robertson, Charlottetown, was a passenger returning from the west Saturday afternoon.

The schooner Daisy is discharging a cargo of Acadia round coal for A. Pickard & Co., Charlottetown.

Percy Keeping, Georgetown, returned home Saturday afternoon from Charlottetown.

Miss Margaret Balderston and Miss Christina McLean, Charlottetown, left Saturday on a trip to the Pacific Coast.

Ava Wilson of Summerside who has been in Charlottetown since Tuesday returned home Saturday evening. While in the city he was the guest of Mrs. A. H. Wadman.

Prof. Kirkpatrick, of Queens University, who was sent by Hon. Frank Cochrane to study the navigation conditions in the Straits of Northumberland with a view to the proposed establishment of a car ferry between Prince Edward Island and the mainland, has sent in his report to the Department of Railways and Canals. —E.C.

The Guardian has received from William McLure, Pictou, three scenic post cards which give a splendid idea of the beauties to be seen while taking a trip in his steamer, the Lady Sybil, plying between Pictou and the Magdalen Islands. The post cards are handsomely colored and show in attractive form, a coast scene of the Magdalen Islands, shore cliffs on Grandstone Island, and the popular S. S. Lady Sybil.

The P. E. I. Light Horse are in orders for camp at Sussex, N.B., from June 25th to July 6th. Arrangements are now being made for transportation. A new service roll is being opened. There is at present a waiting list of twenty-three smart young men anxiously waiting an opportunity to enlist in this corps. Commencing June 18th men can obtain their uniforms, etc., at the Armouries every day from 5 to 6 p. m. and from 7.30 to 8.30 p. m.

Militiamen in this province will be interested in the prohibition imported in the following despatch from Ottawa: "That the regulations concerning the consumption of liquor by men in camps will be rigidly enforced this year, was the emphatic statement of Hon. Col. Sam. Hughes, minister of militia, when asked if there were any new regulations this year governing the consumption of liquor in the training camps. "Regulations are the curse of the world today," was the minister's statement. "They are nothing unless they are enforced, and the existing orders concerning liquor will be strictly adhered to this year." The sale of liquor of any kind is prohibited in camps, and it is said that during this season's camp a strict watch will be kept for any "private supplies" being brought into the lines. Canteens were abolished last year, and although it is stated that drunkenness in many of the camps adjacent to cities increased, they will not be permitted this year."

During the investigation into charges of partisanship made against government officials, H. P. Duchemin of this city visited Whitehead, Guysboro county to enquire into a charge laid against E. L. Munro, preventive officer. The chief witness against the official was a cousin, Chas. Munro, who testified that E. L. Munro told him previous to the last federal election to go and select a pair of boots for himself and that if he voted for Sinclair he could have the boots after the election. He did vote for Sinclair and got the boots. No rebuttal testimony was offered. Shortly afterwards, E. L. Munro laid a charge of perjury against Charles Munro and the case came up for trial before Judge Ritchie in the supreme court session held at Guysboro. Mr. Duchemin was subpoenaed as one of the witnesses. At the trial E. L. Munro denied having given his cousin Charles the boots and said that he had charged them up to him. He offered in evidence a book to prove his statement. The testimony of the daughter of Charles Munro was that she was present during the conversation and corroborated her father's evidence. The jury occupied but a few minutes in deliberation and brought in a verdict of acquittal. The case aroused considerable interest in Guysboro. The case for the crown was conducted by crown prosecutor Floyd, Mr. Fulton appearing for the defence—Sydney exc. (Mr. Duchemin is a native of Charlottetown.)

The many friends of Miss Rose Ryan, Charlottetown, will be glad to hear that she is resting easily after being successfully operated upon in the Charlottetown Hospital.

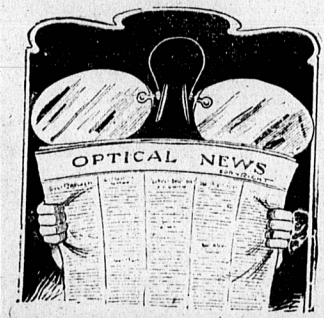
