Shipping News

PURCHASES STEAMER.

Moulton and Company of North Sydney has purchased the 295 ton steamer Herbert Green from Newfoundland parties and will use her this summer in the carrier trade mouth on Saturday last for North Sydney and the Ancient Colony. She left Yarmouth on Saturday last for North Sydney and arrived there yesterday. The Herbert Green is built and although she only registers 295 tons will be an exceptional carrier. She is splendidly fitted and the officers quarters afford every modern convenience, while those for the deck crew are in the forecastle which also contains large galley. The steamer is schooner rigged and carries a full set of canvas. She is also well equipped and averages a speed of 9 1/2 knots. Capt. Noel who will command her, is together with the entire crew, from Newfoundland, Capt. B. N. Melanson of Yarmouth, who built the steamer now has the keel down and work started on another steamer of the Herbert Green type, which when she is launched will be the third one he has put afloat. The first was the M. Sigo now in the West Indies.

THE LEMBERG BROUGHT IN SPLENDID CATCH.

During the past few weeks Halifax has been the centre of the fresh fish business on the Atlantic Canadian seaboard, and the most of the sea food that goes to different points in the Maritime Provinces and Upper Canada, has been landed there. Two or three trawlers have arrived each week with cargoes, reaching the six figure mark and much of this fish has been immediately shipped, as well as supplying the local demand.

CARMANIA HAS 16 TONS OF GOLD.

The steamer Carmania sailed from Liverpool Saturday with a record shipment of gold, amounting to more than sixteen tons (approximately \$9,000,000). The Carmania will probably call at Halifax.

FRENCH STEAMER MISSING.

Two French steamers, the Lux and the Viduban, have been missing since the recent hurricane over the Mediterranean, and it is believed they were lost with all hands. There were 117 persons on board the Lux and twenty five on the Viduban.

FURNESS LINER SACHEM ARRIVED IN HALIFAX SATURDAY.

The Furness liner SACHEM arrived in Halifax Saturday night from Liverpool via St. John's Nfld., and docked Saturday at Pier Three. On board were 35 passengers from St. John's and 12 from Liverpool. Captain G. L. Hayes, formerly in the Furness liner Annapolis, was master of that ship when she was sunk by a German submarine in relieving Captain Robert Richie as master of the SACHEM for this trip. VANCOUVER, March 28.—A special analysis is to be made of an "herb" which when imported into water smelt and tastes like Scotch whiskey, but actually possesses more authority. The "herb" was found on an Oriental named Gun Shee, charged with infraction of the prohibition act. He claims to be the discoverer, but refuses to say whether it is a local or imported "herb".

Complete Collapse.

LONDON, March 29.—The complete collapse of the Communist movement in German Westphalia was forecast in dispatches here today. The Red army which has been holding the line along the River Lippe, between Wesel and Paderborn, collapsed Saturday and was reported in disorganized retreat.

The Central Workers' Council at Essen decided Saturday night to ask for an armistice a dispatch to the Temps said.

Council Refuses German Request To Retain Ships.

PARIS, March 29.—The council of ambassadors today refused Germany's request that she be allowed to retain her gunboats and auxiliary cruisers. The council insisted upon immediate delivery of these vessels to allies.

LONG AND HARD TOW TO HALIFAX.

Eleven days and six hours after she had commenced towing, the steamer Western Comet steamed into Halifax Harbor Sunday afternoon with the disabled ship Nesco safely secured by two lines. The tow had covered a total distance of 1,010 miles since the morning of March 17, and is one of the lengthiest on record. The Nesco had trouble with her engines, which will be repaired in Halifax.

The Nesco, Captain Berge, was bound from New Orleans via Norfolk for Antwerp, when she became disabled about 1,000 miles east of Halifax, and was picked up by the Western Comet, Capt. H. O. Blumchen, enroute from Havre to Philadelphia in ballast. The two ships headed for Halifax at seven o'clock on the morning of March 17th, and encountered some heavy weather on one occasion. They arrived off the harbor about ten o'clock on Saturday night, but owing to heavy fog could not enter. At eleven o'clock Sunday morning they passed Chelbucto Head. Anchoring at quarantine the Western Comet was relieved of her burden, and she docked at the coaling pier, South End Terminal, while the Nesco was placed alongside the Sea Wall. Both are United States Shipping Board ships.

A SHILLING A DAY.

Those anxious for the return of the "good old times" will be interested in an old English record which says that in the building of St. Stephen's, Westminster, in 1350, Edward III. fixed the wages of glazing artists at 5 pence per day to a shilling, "except for a certain John Banahy, whose wages should be two shillings a day." The number of working hours is not stated.

THE CONDEMNATION TAX ON LIVE STOCK SOLD ON PUBLIC STOCK YARDS.

A conference was held on March 24th, between the Federal Department of Agriculture and the Department of the Meat Packing Industry of Canada, following which the Minister of Agriculture authorized a ninety day suspension of the order prohibiting the collection of the condemnation tax on live stock sold on public stock yards. In the interval, a committee with equal representation from Producers, Canadian Packers and the Federal Department of Agriculture will go fully into the question of condemnation and endeavor to evolve a constructive policy, the application of which shall be fair to all concerned and, at the same time, effective in steadily reducing disease in Canadian live stock.

ACTORS IN THE AIR

An aerial theatre is the newest development in futurist art in Paris. The aviator, Czari, known as the best disciple of Marinetti, the founder of futurism, has issued a manifesto signed by the new futurist committee, announcing performances are about to begin. Plays, tragedies, and even ballets will be produced in the air by scores of machines of different power, color, design and speed, which will personify characters. The male parts will be represented by 400-horsepower airplanes, while women will be represented by machines of a "daintier" type.

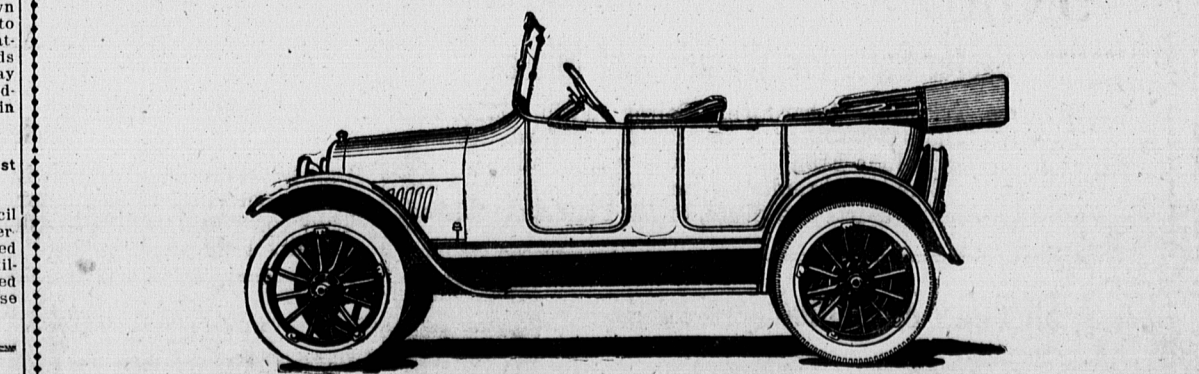
