programme was successfully carried out:

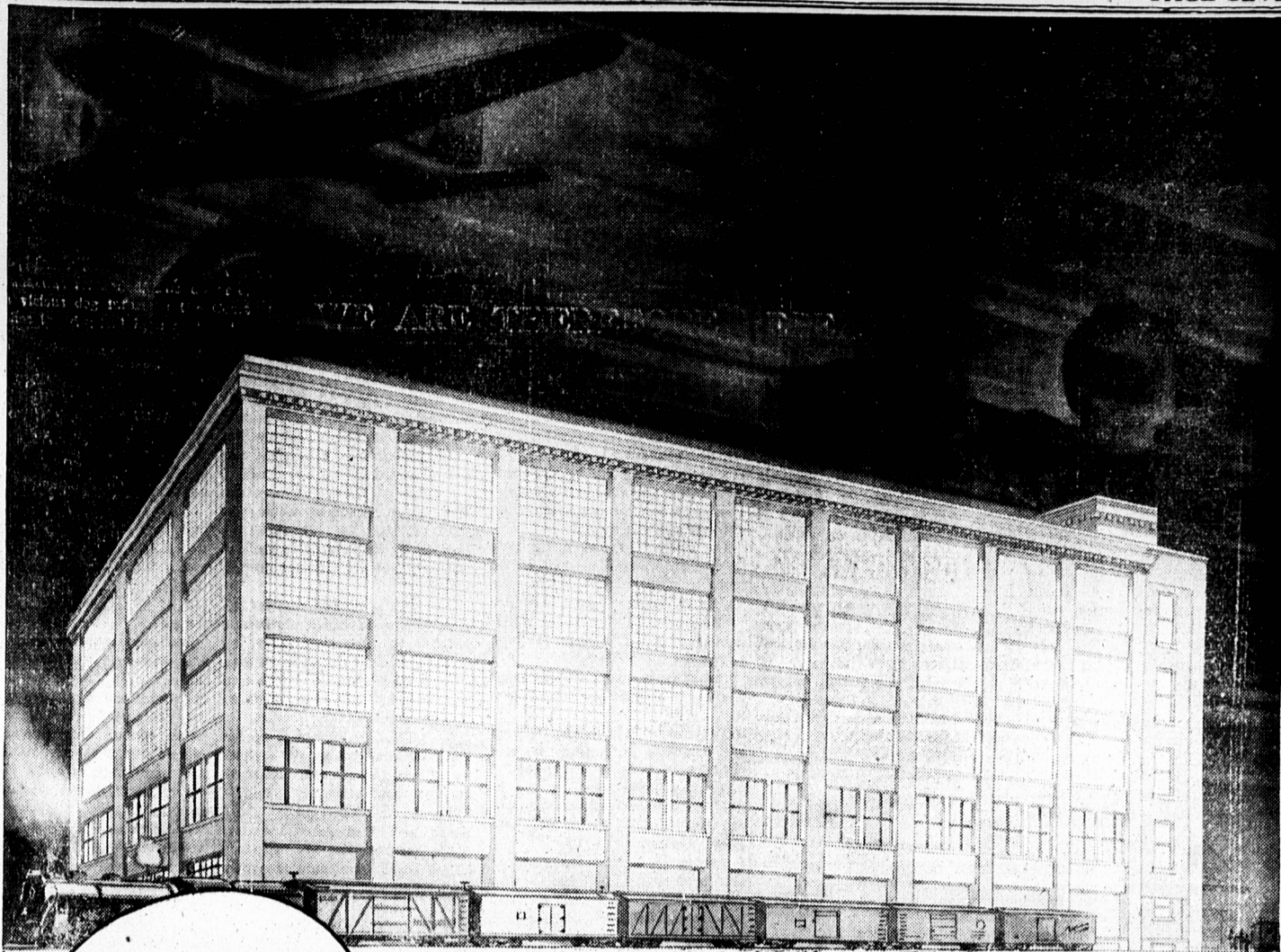
