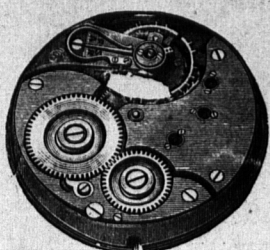

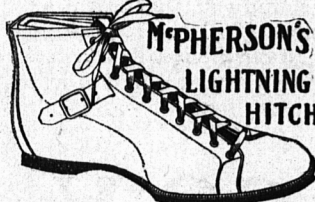

On Saturday evening Dec 30th a delegation from the Murray Harbor Road Sunday School waited on their Superintendent, Hugh McPherson, at his home, Kereka mill, and presented him with a valuable gift, accompanied by an address to which Mr. McPherson very suitably replied, expressing both his surprise and gratitude and hearty thanking the donors.

In the Colonial Herald of April 5th, 1842 appears an advertisement of the loss of a black pocket book with owner's name inside containing one twenty shilling note, one ten shilling do, and four dollars in cash. The finder is asked to return it to the owner James Cameron at R. Hudson's, Esq., Tryon or to R. Hudson, Esq. at his lodgings at Isaac Smith's, architect, Charlottetown.

The home of Roy and Mrs Harding, Bridgewater, Mass., was scene of a very pretty wedding recently when Miss Ida May MacDonald, a sister of Mrs. Harding was united in marriage to Bertrand M. Flood. The ceremony was performed in the front parlor which had been profusely decorated with potted plants and cut flowers. Rev. Wesley L. Smith, pastor of First Baptist church, performed the ceremony in the presence of the immediate relatives and friends of the contracting parties. The bride was attended by Miss Mary K. Metheson, and the best man was Herbert J. Hanlon. The bride wore a charming costume of white tulle with trimmings of lace and white satin ribbons. She carried a bouquet of white carnations. The bridesmaid was attired in a pretty costume of white lawn with lace and blue silk ribbon trimmings. She carried pink and white carnations. Immediately following the ceremony a reception was held, during which the happy couple received congratulations. The bride is a daughter of Duncan MacDonald of St. Peter's, P. E. I.

Following is the career of Dr. W. S. Ferguson, son of Senator Ferguson, whom the University of California is sending abroad on a year's research as announced in The Guardian Saturday.—In 1860 at the age of fifteen, he entered Prince of Wales College, graduating three years later at the head of his class, and taking the Governor General's medal. The same year he entered the second year at McGill University, winning a \$125 exhibition. In 1864 he took a fellowship of the value of \$125. He graduated in 1868 with the highest honors in classics. Entering Cornell University the same year he was awarded a \$300 scholarship, and the next two subsequent years of his post graduate course he held fellowships of \$500 each year. The degree of Ph. D. was taken in 1869. Proceeding to Europe Dr. Ferguson studied for a time at Berlin, and followed up his investigations at Athens. On return to America Dr. Ferguson was called to the University of California, where he became lecturer on Greek, Roman and Byzantine history. In 1868 he was made assistant professor of the department of history, and in the next year he will have completed six years of work in the university, and the above provision has been made for his seventh year. Dr. Ferguson is the author of some important contributions to Greek historical study. In 1888 the McMillan company published the treatise on "The Athenian Secretaries," and the next year the same house brought out his work on "The Athenian Archons." These works contained the results of research and analysis, and in the opinion of scholars have thrown much light on disputed and unsettled points in Greek chronology. At Leipzig there is a publication devoted solely to ancient history, archeology and other kindred sciences. The editorial staff includes eminent scholars in Berlin, Tubingen, Rome, Bonn, Heidelberg, Oxford, St. Petersburg, Göttingen, Prague and other university cities in the old world. Of this publication, "Beilage zur Alten Geschichte," Dr. Ferguson became associate editor in 1903. He is the only member of the staff on this continent.

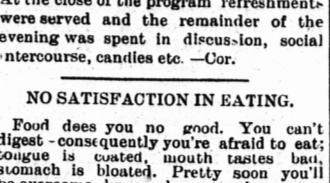
