MONTEAL, Sept. 15—(CP)—A fairly good list of favorites figured in the payoff on rising issues today on the stock exchange. Most advances were fractional but here and there gains were more impressive.

Foundation went to a new high among industrials and others moving upward were Asbestos, Canada Cement, Alcohol "A" General Steel Ware and Massey-Harris. Dominion Coal retrieved some of its loss last week but Disco "B" was weaker along with Dominion Bridge.

Among former metals were Consolidated Smelters, Noranda, Hudson Bay Mining and Bario. International Nickel faced backward.

Papers were mostly better off. International Paper and Power preferred topping the list of winners with a 5 1/2 lift and being followed by the St. Lawrence Corporation issues, and Howard Smith. Price Brothers was chipped a trifle.

Montreal Power, Montreal Tramways, Quebec and Shawinigan edged up in utilities but Bell Telephone edged three points. In transportation issues both C.P.R. and Canada Steamships preferred dropped back fractions and in oil International Petroleum and McColl Frontenac finished ahead.

Distillers - Seagram preferred jumped 13 points among miscellaneous and others getting a boost were Associated Breweries and Laura Secord. Wabasso was in arrears.

LIVESTOCK

MONTEAL, Sept. 15—(CP)—
 Fair offerings of all classes were reported on Montreal livestock markets today with prices about steady. Receipts: cattle, 1,866; calf, 3,695; sheep, 3,787; hog, 3,330.

Early sales of cattle included some good heavy steers at \$9.75 and \$10.25. Three fed calves or baby beefs averaging 705 pounds each sold for \$12 and heifers from \$9 to \$8. Cows ranged from \$3.50 to \$7. The bulk of the cattle were not sold at time of writing. Bulls ranged from \$4.50 to \$7.

The calf market was about steady. Good calves ranged from \$9 to \$13. Good veals brought \$12 to \$13 with medium kinds from \$11 to \$12 and common veals mostly \$9.50 to \$10.50. Drinkers were \$7 to \$9.50 and grassers ranged from \$5.50 to \$9.75. With the bulk of the sales between \$6 and \$6.50.

Good ewes and wethers were firm at \$11.25 to \$11.50 mostly \$10 with one sale at \$11.75. Buck lambs and culls were discounted \$1 per cwt. Sheep were from \$3.50 to \$7, mostly \$5 to \$5.50.

Hogs were unchanged at \$14.75 for B-1 dressed with a few sales at \$14.85, \$11.10 for B-1 alive fed and watered and up to \$11.25 fed trucks delivered. Grade A drew \$1 per hog premium with discounts on all grades. Sows were \$8 to \$9.50 with a few sales up to \$10 live weight.

Grain

CHICAGO, Sept. 15—(AP)—
 Except for a brief rally after mid-session when wheat showed small net gains, grain prices spent most of today's trade fractionally lower through Saturday.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1-2 lower, Sept. 1.18 5/8, Dec. 1.22 1/4—3/8; corn 5-8—7/8 down, Sept. 78 3/4, Dec. 84; oats unchanged to 3/4 off; rye 1-8—3/4 down and soybean 3-1/4 lower. Soybeans broke as much as 4 1/4 in early trade.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 15—(CP)—
 Wheat futures eased slightly today in sympathy with Chicago. Final quotations were 1-2—3/8 lower, October wheat at 73, December 74 5/8 and May 78 7/8.

NEW YORK, Sept. 15—(AP)—
 It was another case of individual favoritism so far as today's lethargic stock market was concerned.

Little activity was shown in Canadian stocks with a few issues ranging higher. Distillers Seagram pfd gained one point to 79 while Lake Shore advanced 1-8 and Walkers 1-4. International Nickel last 3-8 and Distillers Seagram common and Dome both were unchanged.

The Associated Press average of 80 stocks was unchanged at 43.5 of 692 issues traded, 248 were up, 223 down and 221 unchanged. Transfers of 463,850 shares compared with 519,170 in the preceding full session.

Western Union edged into new high ground for 1941, along with Postal Telegraph preferred, on the report a Senate committee had tentatively recommended the merger of these communications systems. Postal clung to a modest advance but W.U. backed down to Saturday's final quotation.

U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors and Chrysler were without variation. A trifle in arrears were U.S. Rubber, Anaconda, Consolidated Edison, Southern Pacific, Great Northern, General Electric and International Nickel. Du Pont and Eastman Kodak lost a point or so each.

Toronto Exchange

TORONTO, Sept. 15—(CP)—
 The industrial share market was stronger, western oils were firm and the mining groups slightly lower on the Toronto exchange today. Volume at 297,000 shares was about 150,000 shares under last week's average.

East Malartic displayed more strain than other golds and it firmed 11 cents to close at 2.38. Duquesne, Fernand, Bidwood-Kirkland, Jason and Murphy improved. Buffalo-Ankerite, Teck Hughes and Macassa added a few cents and the close was down for Anglo-Huronian, Central Patricia Little Long Lac, Malartic Gold Fields, Mining Corporation, O'Brien and Wright-Hargreaves.

Smelters was in demand and the price touched 41 3/8 but it settled back to close at 40 3/4 for a net gain of 3/4. Noranda firmed 1-2 and Nickel lost 1-4. Steep Rock traded in heavy volume and the price touched 1.96 a new high for the year. The close at 1.92 was up 3 cents net. Ventures and Waite-Amulet declined 10 to 15 cents and Sherritt lost 4 cents to 1.03. Pend Oreille held unchanged.

The Massey-Harris stocks traded fairly actively and the common gained 1-4 to 2 7/8 while the pfd edged off 1-2 to 58.

Bell Telephone firmed a point and gains of 1-2 to 3-4 were netted by Abitibi pfd, International Petroleum, Modern Containers, National Grocers of Canada Vinegars and Dominion Bridge.

Minor losses were showing finally for Home and Anglo-Canadian and Footfalls was up 5 to 84.
