Life-Saving Rafts.

PARIS, Dec. 21.—In connection with the construction of the new French trans-Atlantic liners, to run between Havre and New York, the French Government is being urged to test practically a plan to place two great well-equipped rafts, so constructed that they cannot be submerged, on each ship. These rafts would be used as shade decks, and in the event of the ship sinking as the "Bourgoigne" did, the passengers would have a prospect of being saved. The French experts who present this scheme would make the raft to be carried forward, 82 feet long 23 feet wide externally, and 19 feet wide internally. The after raft would be one hundred feet long and of the same width at the forward raft. The two rafts would temporarily accommodate 2,000 persons.

THE S. S. CASPESIA.

(Continued From the First Page.)

The motion was seconded by ex-Mayor Dawson and supported by Mr. Angus McLean in brief addresses, the latter remarking that farmers will receive great benefit from the service, and that we are only beginning to learn what the Island is capable of as a shipper of produce.

Capt. Yates proposed the health of Principal Anderson of Prince of Wales College, as an eminent teacher to whom many foremost Islanders owe much. Dr. Anderson in replying said our system of education had been sometimes blamed for sending men out of country. His answer to this was the number of men around the table, representing many leading interests, all of whom had received their education here. He noted great improvements, notably in farm stock and dairying. This Island, like Denmark, might become a large shipper to the British market. Education was a first requisite, and the average of intelligence here was higher than in any country he had yet visited. Denmark had set us an example by educating her farmers, then sending them to the legislature. They had now 900 steam cheese and butter factories, had abolished the middleman, and by making a first-class article were competing successfully, as we may yet do.

Mr. D. O'M. Reddin proposed the health of Capt. Yates, as a successful Islander abroad and a schoolmate of his in former years. He hoped to become the apothecary of the ship. The toast was drunk with enthusiasm.

Captain Yates in replying said it had been his privilege to be educated under the erudite and eloquent Dr. Anderson and he was proud of the fact. It was the proudest moment of his life to be here now at the inauguration of this steamship service. He knew what the Island could do in the way of production and there was no better market anywhere than that of the Mother Country. He promised that the company would give as good a line and better than had ever been here.

Mr. Longworth desired publicly to convey the thanks of the Canadian Steamship Company to the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company for their assistance tendered when it was learned that the Caspesia had touched ground. Hon. B. Rogers replied that the S. N. Company was only too glad to render any assistance to steamers of other lines and especially in case of an enterprise of so much moment to P. E. Island. He wished the Company every success.

Mayor Warburton proposed, in complimentary terms the health of Capt. McKinnon, of the Caspesia which was very enthusiastically honored. Capt. McKinnon in a brief reply expressed himself as unused to speaking, and would rather face an Atlantic storm than attempt to make a speech. He returned thanks for the kind words spoken. For what had been accomplished he could not accept all credit. He recognized the services of his officers. It was not so easy navigating these parts in winter with the lights out. They got the ship in, without injury too, though she did touch ground when going dead slow in the uncertain light of early morning. The Caspesia is strong as a ship can be built. He felt confident of the success of the enterprise; had met no ice from Cape Race to Pasphebic and thought there would be no difficulty in plying through the Gulf to the end of February or perhaps the middle of March. He could not promise to get into Charlottetown again this winter but would do so if he could.

The above report gives a but a meager synopsis of the many excellent speeches delivered, and all of which were heartily applauded. The company dispersed after singing the National Anthem, all being enthusiastic in praise of the Company's representative, the captain and officers, and the fine steamship Caspesia.

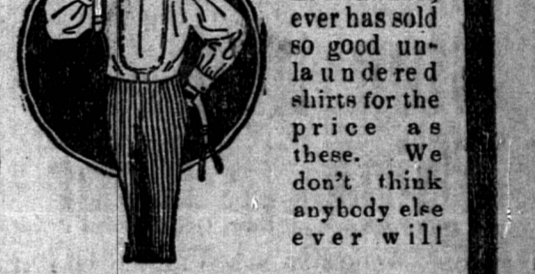
