Tail-end Charlie Has hot spot In big Bombers

WITH THE ROYAL AIR FORCE, Somewhere in England, Feb. 15 — (CP)—The job of tail-gunner—or "tail-end Charlie," as bomber crews call him—is one of the most uncomfortable tasks in the Air Force, and sometimes the loneliest. Sgt. Libert Boucher, a Royal Canadian Air Force wireless operator-gunner from Grand Falls, N.B., made two trips to Hamburg and Berlin as tail-gunner in lumbering Whitley bombers and he should know. It was like riding in the back of a truck on a bumpy road and both flights didn't end in the prescribed fashion. For a long time, too, during the second flight Boucher was isolated in his turret when the later-communicating telephone was out of order.

Describing the Hamburg raid, the 27-year-old airman said that the anti-aircraft fire was so intense that it wasn't even funny, and it was better than any fourth of July celebration I ever want to see. "They were coming pretty darn close to us as we dropped our bombs and I felt a bump." Boucher related, "We were hit in the fuselage. I didn't know for a minute what it was. Then I smelled cordite and heard someone groan. 'I'm hit.'"

"I didn't know who it was but I had a vague idea it was the captain and that we'd be for it. But it was the wireless operator, an English chap, and he was hit in the face and shoulder pretty badly. He couldn't wear his oxygen mask because of his facial wounds but he worked all the way home just the same."

The starboard rudder control was severed by the hit and before the machine was out of the target area the captain, a New Zealander, was obliged to order the crew to prepare to bail out.

"Then the searchlights caught us," Boucher continued. "How we managed to get out of it I don't know, because we couldn't do any evasive action with the bad rudder. Just as we were coming away I saw another of our kites caught in the lights and shot down in flames. After we got out of the target area it was straight sailing, but we had a bumpy landing. Nobody was hurt but I was knocked out for three or four minutes when the tail swung around."

Boucher gave a glowing account of the work of the second pilot, Sgt. Ronnie Miller, whose home is near Saskatoon. "He was good on that trip," the Grand Falls man said. "The more Jerry fired at us the madder he got, but he wasn't excited at all."

Boucher's next flight as tail-gunner was on Berlin Nov. 7 when 37 British aircraft were lost, mostly
