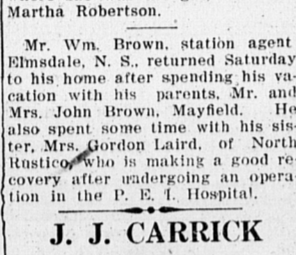
Miss Viola Ballen, of Waterside, spent the past week visiting friends in North Lake and Munns Road.

Hon. George W. Howland and the T. Heath Haviland went to Ottawa and obtained "Better Terms". These terms included the payment by Canada of \$800,000 for the purchase of the proprietary estates, and the transfer to Canada of the P. E. Island Railway together with the obligations incurred on account of its construction. Thus by suggesting a plan for the abolition of the Proprietary system, by the construction of the railway and by the "Better Terms," Mr. Pope succeeded while Leader of the Island Government, in removing from the people the incubus of rent payments, to absentee landlords, in supplying the people with railway accommodation, and in changing the political condition of the island from that of a mere colony of the Mother Country, to that of a Province of the Dominion of Canada.

After the entry of Prince Edward Island into the Union, Mr. Pope was Premier of the Province for about three months. In the partial election of members of the House of Commons, which followed the Union he was chosen to represent Prince County. He was not successful at the succeeding General election in which the administration of Sir John A. Macdonald was defeated as a result of the Pacific Scandal.

Afterwards he again took an active part in Provincial politics. Contrary to the wishes and advice of his former colleagues in the years before Confederation, he came to the support of the Roman Catholic Bishop of Charlottetown, who had established several large and excellent denominational schools in the principal towns of the Province, and appealed to the electorate for "Payment for Results in respect to the Secular education afforded in these schools. The contest proved to be practically a trial of strength between the Roman Catholics and the Protestants; and as the latter has a large majority in the Province Mr. Pope was defeated.

But a vacancy in the representation of Queen's County for the House of Commons was forthwith caused by the appointment of the Hon. David Laird to the office of Lieutenant Governor of the Northwest Territories. Mr. Pope seized the opportunity thus offered. After a spirited contest with his own brother-in-law, Mr. William Welsh, he was elected as a supporter of the Opposition and Sir John Macdonald. In the general election of 1878, Mr. Pope was again successful; and upon the foundation of the Macdonald Administration he became a member of the Cabinet and Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

His devotion to politics had however, necessitated neglect of his extensive business interests and resulted in heavy personal losses. Mr. Pope had been one of the leading shipbuilders and ship owners of the Province, and a farmer upon a large scale. As a man of business he was open-handed and exceedingly enterprising. He gave a distinct impulse to the growth of the town of Summerside, and he had large interests in Charlottetown, Casimpeck and other parts of the Province, as well as at sea. His public and private cares weighed heavily upon his mind and even before his last entrance to Parliament of Canada he had begun to break down under the depressing and prolonged nervous disorder to which he at length in the Spring of 1885 fell a victim, at the age of fifty-nine years.

Hold Boston Officer For Queer Crime

BOSTON, Oct. 18.—A chain of uncanny disturbances which since last July have annoyed patrons of a large vaudeville theatre here and which, for the last month, caused performances to be given with lights on throughout the house was believed by the police to have been ended today.

More than a dozen persons have been injured and police investigators have been baffled by the hurrying and rocks into the audience of the theatre at practically every performance for ten weeks. A number of persons including several women were struck and injured.

Search for the cause which brought as many as 120 investigators into the theatre at one performance, failed for weeks. Yesterday, however, Walter Matthews, for two years a special officer in the theatre, was arrested and today faced arraignment and examination by officials.

Matthews declared he was unable to explain his act. "Irresistible impulse" made him do it, he insisted.
