THE POTATO SITUATION

It was a disappointment to the potato growers and dealers of Prince Edward Island, when the press announced that Hon. John Gilmour, Minister of Agriculture of Great Britain did not raise the embargo to admit Canadian potatoes. Every person interested in potatoes realized that there is a large surplus of potatoes in Canada, as well as in United States, and it is doubtful if a market can be found for all the marketable potatoes.

It is unwise to suppose that all the potatoes in Prince Edward Island can be shipped in a short time. It will take weeks and months to dispose of them in an ordinary way, and we feel that it is better to keep a regular supply moving from the Island at a small price, than to dump them later on.

We can find a market for a limited quantity of good sound potatoes, and we are prepared to co-operate with the farmers, especially in the district of Charlottetown, where we have warehouse facilities for packing the stock carefully, and are prepared to supply bins and labor, and sell the potatoes to the best advantage for a very small commission.

GUYSBORO, N. S., Feb. 6.—(By the Canadian Press)—A copper pot of ancient design, containing a human skull, was discovered today by a Guysboro youth who dug it out of a cliff near the town. The youth was hunting when he saw part of the pot sticking out of the ground. With the aid of another hunter he uncovered it and brought it to town, where a doctor will examine it tomorrow. Disastrous Fire At P. W. College

The following report is reprinted from Saturday's city edition of The Guardian:

Silhouetting Zion Church, four blocks away, against the early morning sky, flames shooting from Prince of Wales College at four o'clock this morning were gutting the famous institution which has contributed many famous men to the world, including Jacob Gould Schurman to the United States.

Members of the Guardian staff, running down Grafton St. after the fire had been seen from the rear windows of the Guardian, were amazed to see huge splinters of livid fire spitting forth from the three windows just below the "Ich Dien" motto, high above the main entrance. The tower in the middle of the building was a blaze, the interior of the structure being photographed on the lone spectators' brain. A circular tower to the right of the main tower was also ablaze, presenting a picture of Dantes' inferno to the watching people. The illusion was helped along by the peculiar color of the flames which were a sort of greenish blue from the copper plating on the round tower.

The first people arrived on the scene before the fire alarm had sounded. They met a provincial policeman who excitedly called to them to come to help extricate the janitor and his family, who were believed to still be in the building. With hearts beating like trip hammers, those first on the scene hurried to the end entrance as smoke and flames barred entrance at the janitors exit. With difficulty, the heavy plate glass in the doors leading to the Model School was broken and an attempt made to enter. However, the black wall of breath-taking smoke which was met stopped any effective advance. By this time the building exclusive of the Model School section was a blazing inferno and the anxious rescuers were between Scylla and Charybdis. What to do? That was the question. By this time the firemen had arrived, the alarm bell rung in about 3.20 a. m. Ladders were rushed for but before they could be secured the joyous information was received that Caretaker P. Ryan and his family were safe. What a relief!

By 3.30 a small crowd was beginning to form. Among the first to arrive were city policemen who did much to help the firemen, directing the crowd in laying water lines. The firemen arrived about 3.25. At 3.30 two streams of water were being directed on the blazing roof.

As the deluges of water, driven by huge pressure a hundred feet high struck the flames they curled and danced, while all the colors of the spectrum shot throughout the building and mounted to the skies above. It was a pretty but withal an awesome spectacle to those standing there in the early morning hours watching the second major disaster suffered by government buildings in the last few months. At twenty to four the tower in the middle, in which the fire is believed to have started, fell, sending up showers of sparks for all the world reminiscent of the sparks which flew off Tubal Cain's anvil as he fashioned his implements of war. About this time the round tower on the left of the central tower caught, as also did the roof of the Model School. At a quarter to four the fire within the interior was rapidly gaining ground and the blackboards of room 26 could be plainly seen. At ten to four huge billows of flames were descending from the sun room just off room 10 which is the classroom nearest Grafton Street. These huge licks of light were stretching half way across the street.

At a quarter after four it was evident that the entire build-

ing was doomed as the roof of the main part had fallen and the interior of the rest of the building was blazing, shooting sparks and embers for block away like a Roman candle. The streams of water were making no apparent difference, serving only to cause the flames to crackle the more. At 4.35 the Model School was burning fiercely, a slight wind having sprung up which was fanning the conflagration. The rest of the building was burning fiercely on the ground floors, only the walls being intact at the top of the building. The walls presented a cameo appearance, the blackened brick standing out against the fiery background in sharp relief. At ten to five the building was gutted, only the walls standing.

The caretaker, Mr. Patrick Ryan, interviewed by a Guardian representative, stated that he woke up about 3.10 startled by a crackling noise. On investigation, he discovered smoke issuing from a region near the middle tower. He was of the opinion the fire started thereabouts. He and his wife and four children made a hasty exit, the children in their bare feet. They were just in time. A half minute later there exit would have been impossible. Flames and smoke sweeping down the staircase which leads from their rooms on the third floor to an exit set in the front about thirty yards from the main entrance. At 11 o'clock when Mr. and Mrs. Ryan retired there was no sign of any conflagration. Upon making their exit, they went across the campus to the home of Mr. R. E. Spillet which faces the college on Weymouth Street. Here they were well cared for and telephone communication with the fire station established with the loss this morning to be a severe one! The original building was erected in 1897. The building burned was constructed in 1908 and was a fine up-to-date college structure. The value of the building and equipment was approximately \$250,000. There is \$175,000 worth of insurance. The contractors who built the consumed structure were Lowe Brothers. The building is a total loss, all records being destroyed.

The seriousness of the conflagration may be grasped by the fact that there are about 350 students attending the college. The most of these, in all probability, will be compelled to return home with the resultant loss to the city of their cost of living, beside the halt in their education. The monetary loss will be severe.
