—GOOD ROADS.—The weather for the last few days being milder and roads in the pink of condition, traffic to and from the country has picked up wonderfully, farmers bringing up hay and oats to market and returning home with coal or some other commodity for private use.—H.

—FIREMEN OUT.—The Summerside Fire Department was called out on Sunday forenoon about 11 o'clock for a fire at the Globe Hotel at the east end of the town, conducted by Mr. Reuben Durant. The fire is supposed to have started from the flue and burned a small hole in the roof. The damage fortunately was slight.

—HOME FROM U. S.—Messrs. Bennett and Harold Howard, Cape Wolfe arrived here from Boston on Saturday night, the Car Ferry was so late in docking that the train for Tignish did not wait for mails or passengers, these young men were therefore obliged to spend over Sunday in town. They did not speak very flattering of times in the States as many idle men are found in every city there but better times are being looked for in the Spring.—H.

—FIRE INSURANCE.—The regular monthly meeting of the P. E. Island Agricultural Mutual Fire Insurance Company was held in the office of the manager at Summerside last Thursday, sixty applications for insurance were received and passed and the following losses ordered to be paid: John Lawless, Kensington, damage to house and furnishings, \$35.45; Daniel McPhee, Nine Mile Creek, damage to house and furnishings, \$975; Reginald Dixon, Tryon, pigery burned \$100, damage to house \$50; Freeman Bowley, Midgell, house and furnishings burned, \$620; Thomas MacNutt, Malpasque, barns burned and produce, \$982; J. W. Riley, Montague, house burned, \$400. Total—\$3,062.45.

—TOWN COUNCIL.—A meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held on Monday night with the Mayor and the full board of councillors present. Councillor Pope withdrew his resignation which was submitted at a previous meeting and laid on the table till this meeting. The matter of power rates was further discussed and a scale of rates was decided on for the present. On the motion of Councillor Pope seconded by Councillor McNally it was requested that the recorder be presented at the next session of the local legislature an enactment empowering the town of Summerside to issue debentures for electric light plant in the sum of \$50,000 in denominations of \$500 and bearing interest at the rate of 5 percent, principal payable on June 15, 1945, interest payable at the Town Clerk's office semi-annually on the 15th of June and the 15th of December, with an annual sinking fund of not less than \$37.25 per \$1,000. The property committee were empowered to buy up to 25 tons of stone and 25 tons of brush for repairs to the town wharf and were instructed to sell one of the buildings on the wharf.

—KENSINGTON DAIRYING MEETING.—The annual meeting of the Kensington Dairymen's Association took place in the Temperance Hall, Kensington, on Tuesday, Jan. 20th at President C. M. Howatt presiding. The attendance was unusually large and of great interest manifested throughout. The president in his report gave a lucid and detailed account of the business transacted during the year. The Secretary's report showed a gain in quantity of milk received this year over last year by 21,259 lbs. while the receipts showed a decrease of \$10,899 as compared with last year. Milk supplied for cheese 3,449,071 lbs. Average price received for cheese 15.44 cts per lb. Value of butter fat to patrons not including the whey butter: 5258 lbs. Whay butter manufactured 5258 lbs. receipts \$1,667. Creamery butter made 4667 lbs. receipts \$1,207.05 Value of butter fat to patrons 33.4 per lb. During the season a new whey tank was installed at Kensington while a new concrete floor was put in the Hamilton Branch. Inspector Morrow, Official Grader for the Province was present and gave an excellent address on the care of milk. He stressed the grave importance of each and every patron providing adequate means for keeping the milk in good condition thus avoiding a great loss in the price received for our products. The following patrons received the largest amounts:—C. M. Howatt \$787.38, John Johnson \$757.28, W. L. Johnson \$741.53, Charles H. Harris \$688.62, Glyden & Son \$645.92, J. W. Stewart \$621.87. A circular letter from the Department of Agriculture re the Co-operative purchasing of supplies and marketing of dairy products was received and considered favorably by the meeting. The following directors were appointed: President C. M. Howatt, Vice-President T. A. Driscoll, Charles Hucstis, John Simpson and James Donald. Messrs C. M. Howatt, G. W. Ramsay and W. L. Johnson were appointed delegates to the annual meeting of the Provincial Dairymen's Association which meets in Charlottetown the latter part of February.

MANY YEARS A MISSION PRIEST AND RESIDENT OF WILLISTON, WELL KNOWN AS A MUSICIAN OF RARE ABILITY

The following is from the Williston Herald, Williston, North Dakota relative to the death and funeral of Rev. S. J. Arsenault. Father Arsenault had a great many friends and relatives in this Province who mourn his death.

Rev. S. J. Arsenault, former priest of the Williston parish and well known as a musician, died here Sunday morning at the age of 63 years. He was educated at St. Dunstan's college, Prince Edward Island and at St. Joseph's university, New Brunswick, being ordained priest in 1891. During the following ten years he taught music at St. Jo-

became to Mercy hospital as a patient. Father Arsenault was an accomplished organist but his speciality in music was band work, and his services in instructional capacity were at the disposal of every community in which he lived. He undertook the task of instructing the Williston band, which was organized a short time after his arrival here last fall, but the rapid progress of the fatal ailment forced him to give up even this work a few weeks after it had been undertaken.

Father Arsenault was the oldest of nine children, and is survived by the other eight—four brothers and four sisters. In the order of age they are:—Mrs. A. Gallant, Madeline Island; Joseph F. Arsenault, Egmont Bay; P. E. L.; Jacqueline Arsenault, Ray; A. E. Arsenault, Judge of the supreme court, Prince Edward Island; Mrs. W. P. Dugal, Quebec; A. J. Arsenault, Williston; Octavie Arsenault, Madeline Island, and T. O. Arsenault, Minneapolis.

Miss Jacqueline Arsenault, now housekeeper for Father Halloran at Ray, kept house for Father Arsenault during all the years of his work as priest.

The funeral services were held at St. Joseph's church, with the Rt. Rev. V. Wehrle, bishop of the diocese, as celebrant of the mass. Father Dougherty of Alexander was deacon, Father Halloran of Ray, subdeacon, and Father O'Neill of Williston, master of ceremonies. The choir was under the leadership of Father Ott of Foxholm with T. O. Arsenault at the organ.

Assisting at the ceremonies were Father Kopp of Bowbells, Father Blackburne of Crosby, Father Lattinier of Powers Lake, Father Mueller of St. Boniface, Father Heinz of Mohal, Father Feehan of Stanley, Father Benedict of Wolf Point and most of the Protestant clergymen of the city. Father O'Neill officiated at the grave side.
