Pope May Nominate Canadian Cardinals

QUEBEC Oct. 18.—Advices received in religious circles from Rome has it that in the first week of December, a secret consistory will be called, at which some new Cardinals will be created. The ceremony will be followed by an open consistory, at which two Spanish Cardinals recently created will be given the Red Hat. This report is connected here with previous information coming from some members of the Canadian clergy residing in the Holy City to the effect that one, and perhaps two, Canadian Cardinals would be created on that occasion to succeed the late Cardinal Beaudry, and associating his grace, Mr. Emard Archbishop of Ottawa as a most probable nominee.

MUCH PRODUCE.—More produce is being hauled in Summerside this season than for many seasons past. Potatoes, oats, etc., are being hauled in in great quantities. The good prices prevailing are perhaps the principal reason for the influx.

FISHING.—There are still some lobsters being taken into Summerside by the fishermen. Most of the fishermen are devoting their time to fishing smelts at present. Some very good catches are being taken which are being shipped to Boston. The present price being received is 15 cents but the market is rather uncertain.

POTATOES.—Any farmer who has a good crop of potatoes this season is bound to make a good lot of money. As reports go, the Irish Cobblers are a great crop and are pretty near all sound and of good quality. The blight hurt the Green Mountains considerably and there is some dry rot. In some sections the farmers are going to grade their Green Mountains for table stock. The ordinary table potatoes are also commanding good prices and will be a splendid source of revenue this fall.

DIED AT BORDEN.—The death occurred at Borden yesterday morning of Mr. Timothy Macdonald one of the prominent coal merchants of Amherst, N. S., for the past 30 years. Mr. Macdonald came to Borden 9 days ago in good health to visit his brother Mr. Daniel Macdonald. He became ill shortly after arriving and gradually grew worse until he passed away yesterday morning at the age of 70 years. His wife predeceased him several years ago. The only surviving near relative is his brother Mr. Daniel Macdonald, Borden at whose home he died. Notice of the funeral will be announced later.

LATE THOMAS SMITH.—Mr. Thomas Smith, one of the most highly respected residents of Middleton passed away at the Prince County Hospital Summerside shortly before seven o'clock yesterday morning. The late Mr. Smith who was in his 74th year entered the hospital about 2 weeks ago for a critical operation. The operation was successful and he seemed to be improving until last Thursday when he began to fail and his condition grew gradually worse until the end came yesterday morning. The deceased although of a quiet and unobtrusive nature was well known and well liked by all. He leaves besides a sorrowing widow an only daughter Mrs. Stephen Johnson, Kinkora and 7 sons, Vernon of Summerside, Ernest, George and Charles in Alberta, Russell in Toronto John in Boston and Eugene on the homestead. The Guardian extends sincere sympathy to the bereaved. The funeral will be held Wednesday morning.


