Advertisement for 'Tuberculosis Is Losing Its Hold'. Text: 'TORONTO, Oct. 19.—Dr. R. E. Wodehouse, of Ottawa, secretary of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association, told the annual convention of the Ontario Hospital Association here yesterday that tuberculosis obstetrics and heart disease kill more people between the ages of 20 and 45 years than any other three diseases. Although the death rate from tuberculosis had been reduced to no less than half what it was twenty-five years ago, this disease still led in the group of ailments causing the death of the persons of the most useful age, from the community's standpoint. Obstetrics—the delivery of women in child-birth—accounted for the greatest number of deaths between the ages of 20 and 45; heart disease was a close third on the list of killing ailments. Cancer, to which so much attention was being paid, was only fifth or sixth. Dr. Wodehouse made a strong appeal for the establishment of health centres in hospitals. Supporting the plea for health centres, Dr. J. H. Holbrook, of Hamilton said he did not believe that the general practitioners of today were practising scientific medicine. The old family physician was a keen observer and he carried his own science in his head. But doctors today had got away from that and many could not even examine chests thoroughly. The need of the present was county health centres where diagnostic service could be given. Mother—The new cook says she wants to be treated as one of the family. Father—Good!
