HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 12.—The fifth game in the World's Series was played at Washington today and then touched first. No when the Pittsburgh Pirates came back strong and trimmed the Senators 6 to 3, netting thirteen hits off the four pitchers used by Washington.

Pittsburg got their batting eye working and bunched well placed hits in the third and seventh innings that made the Washington crew more uneasy as each time they came to bat.

The teams travelled back to Pittsburgh last night where the sixth game will take place on the Pirates home grounds today, Tuesday, following is a summary of the game:

First Innings Pirates—Moore fouled out to Peck, who took the catch at the stands, Carey laced a single to left field, Cuyler got a Texas leaguer in to right, Coveleskie nearly caught hard liner to Barnhart, who stopped it in a glove hand catch as it was headed for the bleachers, Goose saved trouble, Traynor walked, Wright grounded to S. Harris, Rice, two hits, no errors.

Second Innings Pirates—McInnis drove out a hard one, Goslin taking it on the run, Smith caught a splitter on the nose and shot into for one base, Aldridge hit into a double play, Bluege to Harris to Judge. No runs, one hit, no errors.

Third Innings Pirates—Moore sent a roller to Bluege who caught him at first with a snappy throw, Carey walked on four straight balls, Cuyler up, Carey in stealing second collided with Stan Harris and both teams gathered around, water was brought, finally he arose and after a few turns said he was again hit, Cuyler awaited a free pass to first, Barnhart singled to left, scoring Carey and Cuyler stopped on third, Traynor up, an attempt to double steal, Barnhart went to second and Cuyler dashed for home, but returned to third, Traynor drove out a fly to Rice, Cuyler scoring after the catch, Rice threw to third and held Barnhart on second, Wright grounds to Peck, out at first, Zachary and Marberry warming up for Washington, two runs, one hit, no errors.

Fourth Innings Pirates—Adams batted for Marberry grounds to Aldridge out at first, Rice grounds to Wright and Barnhart, No runs, no hits, no errors. They travel back to Pittsburgh for the sixth game.
