ing was destroyed by fire some five years ago, and the future prospects of this the oldest College in the Empire outside of the Motherland. The President's address was received with much applause and after a few remarks by the Chairman enthusiastic addresses were delivered by Mr. H. J. Palmer, J. O. Hyndman and George D. DeBlois.

On motion it was decided to form a Local Council of the King's University League, with the following officers:

President—His Honor Judge Warburton.

Secretary—Mr. A. B. Cosh.

Treasurer—Mr. George D. DeBlois

Executive Committee, Percy Pope, J. O. Hyndman, L. B. Miller, W. L. Cotton and T. E. MacNutt.

Mr. McNutt informed the meeting that there are at present twenty four members of the League in St. Paul's congregation and fifteen in congregation of St. Peter's Cathedral.

Several others joined the League at this meeting.

The feeling of the meeting was well expressed in the address of Mr. George D. DeBlois in which he welcomed Dr. Moore to the island and stated that he was prepared to put his shoulder behind King's College and push it for all he was worth.

Thus was brought to a close a meeting which showed that the men of the two City congregations are realizing more than ever the claims of this old Church College for their support and also the realization of the great work which lies before their College in the Maritime Provinces.

### Mr. J. A. Clark Wins Scholarship

MONTREAL, Oct. 19.—Announcement is made of the awarding of ten scholarships donated annually by the Macdonald Tobacco Company for post graduate work in scientific agriculture. These scholarships, which have a value of \$500 each, are tenable at Macdonald College, Ste. Anne De Bellevue, Que.

Two of them are allotted to Quebec Province and one each to the other Provinces, the winners being chosen by the Provincial Agricultural Colleges on the basis of meritorious work done by their students. The provincial scholarship winners and the subjects in which they will specialize during their post graduate course include:

Quebec (2)—Lionel Deriault, (Oka), and J. B. Maltais—Entomology.

Nova Scotia—Kenneth Harrison, Plant Pathology.

New Brunswick—H. K. Atkinson, chemistry.

Prince Edward Island—J. A. Clark, Charlottetown, agronomy.

### Plant of Simms

### Packer's Limited Entered

Some time during Sunday night entrance was effected to the "pork packing plant of the Simms Packer's Limited and a ham and loin of pork taken.

Discovery of the theft was made by Mr. Vernon Gay who while coming along Kent Street noticed a man crossing the street with a ham and bacon under his arm. The thief threw away the ham and proceeded down the street on the run and as he had quite a start managed to elude his pursuer. Yesterday a young man about 20 years of age was arrested and brought up for trial. The case however was adjourned and the defendant will appear again today.

### Could Pay Each Criminal \$20,000 Annually

(Canadian Press) CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—Crime in Chicago costs the city so much each year that it could well afford to pay each of its estimated 30,000, crooks \$20,000 annually or \$600,000,000 to leave town. C. R. Holden, President of Chicago Crime Commission told a church audience yesterday.

He estimated that approximately one percent of the city's 3,000,000 population are engaged in criminal pursuits and asserted crime had increased 100 percent here since 1900.

### Recommends reduction of U.S. Taxes

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—Tax reduction of \$250,000,000 to \$300,000,000 was recommended to Congress of United States today by Secretary of Treasury Mellon. Without attempting to lay down definite schedules, he suggested that reduction in surtaxes to twenty percent in place thirty seven percent would not cripple the treasury.

### Dominion Live Stock Report

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Oct. 19.—Cattle receipts 1912. Bulk of cattle offered today were of very common quality. Best steers sold for seven dollars good cows sold for export realized five twenty five and five fifty.

Common big bodied cows in good flesh were around four fifty. Best heifers were picked out for export at six dollars. Medium good kinds of light butcher steers realized five seventy five and plain butchers cattle made up of cows and heifers and light steers four twenty five and four fifty. Canners were two dollars and Bologna bulls from three to three fifty according to weight.

Quotations butcher's steers good \$6.50 to \$7.00, medium \$5.25 to \$6.00, common \$4.00 to \$5.00; butcher heifers good \$5.75 to \$6.00, medium \$4.50 to \$5.50, common \$3.50 to \$4.25; medium cows good \$4.50 to \$5.25, medium \$3.00.

Calf receipts 3,033. Practically all veal calves offered were just ordinary quality and sales of these

were from ten to eleven dollars. Heavy fall fed calves brought six fifty to eight fifty and grassers four fifty to five fifty bulk of sales five dollars and over.

Quotations good veal \$11.00, medium \$9.00 to \$10.00, common \$6.50 to \$8.50, grassers \$4.00 to \$5.50.

Sheep receipts 12,213. Lambs were about twenty five cents earlier. Early sales were confined mostly to common and medium kinds and straight carloads of fair quality lambs brought eleven and eleven twenty five.

Common lambs held down to ten fifty and good lots of bucks included eleven fifty. Indications are that bulk of good lambs will sell for eleven fifty or possibly a shade better. Sheep were four dollars to six twenty five. One good lot of ewes and wethers sold for eleven seventy five.

Quotations ewes \$4.00 to \$6.25, lambs good \$11.50, common \$10.50 to \$11.00.

Hog receipts 3,073. Hogs were lower, mixed lots of hogs of good quality and weight brought twelve fifty and the ruling quotation for selects was thirteen dollars. Sows all veal calves offered were just ordinary quality and sales of these

twenty five.
