THE GOVERNORSHIP.

From what THE GUARDIAN can learn the Governorship is still in the clouds. Nothing has been definitely settled. Some recent letters in the Liberal organ in this city strongly presenting the claims of Premier Farquharson to the position were thought by many to be intended to prepare the public mind for his appointment as a thing already decided upon. We are satisfied that no such decision has been reached or is likely to be.

Not that Mr. Farquharson would not make an excellent Governor if appointed, and not that a host of personal and political friends would not like to see him in the highest official position in our midst. There are other considerations. Mr. Farquharson might not desire at present to seek the quiet of Government House. He is yet too young to be shelved. His party needs him where is, and his acceptance of another position would involve a radical reconstruction of the provincial Executive. We have been satisfied from the first that the almost invariable precedents would be followed by selecting the new Governor from among the number who have seen service in one or other house of the federal parliament. There has always been a strong feeling at Ottawa that the higher positions in the gift of the federal power belong to those who have done service in the larger field of Dominion politics. It is an open secret that Hon. John Yeo could have the honor of being of Governor and would be acceptable to all classes and creeds if he would take the position. It is equally an open secret that he has been reluctant to accept the honor. Should he finally and definitely refuse, then the claims of others who have served in federal affairs would have to be considered.

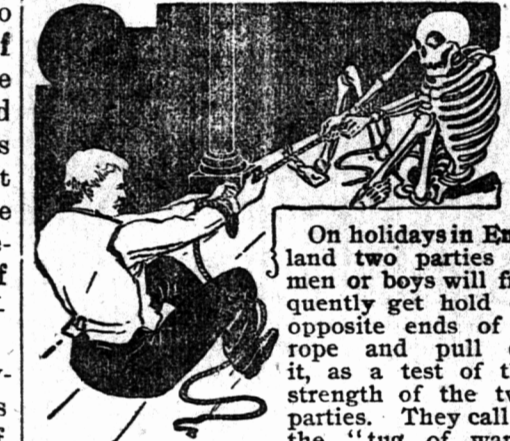
In the meantime it may be observed that though Governor Howlan has already served five years, his term of office has not expired, in the ordinary sense of the word. A Governor holds office until his successor is appointed. It has been no uncommon thing for the five years' term to be exceeded by several months. It requires no official act by the authorities at Ottawa to extend Governor Howlan's term. He will remain in office with full power till his successor is named, be that a month or a year hence.

Mr. Meddie Gallant did not appeal in vain to the full court. The judgment of the Master of the Rolls had unseated and disqualified him. The judgment of the full court reaffirms the decision that his seat is made vacant but reverses the disqualification. Mr. Gallant will therefore be eligible for re-election should he choose to become a candidate and should his friends re-nominate him. Mr. Justice Hodgson still adheres to the position which he took at the election trial, but we think the general sentiment of the community will agree with the majority of the court that the case was not one for the extreme penalty of the law. The judgment now rendered makes it quite clear that an evening newspaper was

wrong in assuming that a full Bench would necessarily confirm Mr. Gallant's disqualification.

It appears by the extract from the New York Herald, quoted by Dr. Strickland in another column, that some of the people of St. Christopher Nevis have been amusing themselves by writing a somewhat insulting letter to Mr. Chamberlain, the Colonial Secretary. Their island, Nevis, is a mere speck on the ocean's surface and contains not as many people as the city of Charlottetown. They are mostly of negro blood and their understanding is darker than their hides. It is quite natural they should want to join the large negro community in the Southern States, and so, after the manner of the tailors of Tooley street they issue their little proclamation through the New York Herald—"We the people of the Leeward Islands want to be annexed." What right have these Nevis people to speak for the Leeward Islands? Not one in four of them can write their own names. The 'bull and bobsled line is modern and progressive compared with them. It would be no calamity to Britain if they went over to Uncle Sam and added to the white man's burden at Washington. Certainly Canada does not want them.

In a remarkable collection of Japanese dwarfed plants lately exhibited by Mrs Ernest Hart to the Royal Botanic Society of London, each specimen was said to be more than a century old, and the tallest, tree was less than 18 inches in height, although having all the characteristics in miniature of the full grown forest giant. This curious art of tree dwarfing is one of Japan's secrets.
