

Provincial Prohibition Bill Receives Its Second Reading

THE BRILLIANT ADDRESS

of Premier Farquharson Listened to By a Crowded Legislature.

\$250 WAS OFFERED TO A MEMBER AS A BRIBE

To Vote Against Prohibition--Four Amendments Moved by The Opposition Which were Rejected by a Straight Party Vote--Bill will Be Read a Third Time This Morning and The House will Be Prorogued at 2 O'clock This Afternoon.

FRIDAY June 8th.

House met at 10.45. On motion of Mr. Rogers the House resolved itself into Committee with Mr. McWilliams in the chair to take in consideration the Bill to further amend an Act to consolidate and amend the several Acts incorporating the city of Charlottetown.

Mayor is elected at present. A plebiscite will be taken in February next and if the voices of the people are in favor of the Bill the wards will be done away with a year later.

had to expend a large sum of money to repair Southport wharf and some \$400 on Fullerton bridge. Over a year before the Liberals came in the Southport boiler had been out of repair and neglected. The people on the south side therefor had only the little Elfin for their accommodation. The member for Belfast had sneeringly alluded to the new boat and called her "The Boodler." But his constituents do not call her thus but all speak well of her and the work she does. Then the Liberal Government put Prince St. Wharf in good repair and an excellent waiting room. At Mt. Stewart an abattoir was built and a good wharf was secured under the able management of Hon. F. Peters. Although there had been considerable money expended still there is something to show for it. The wharves are now in capital order. There are some of the reasons why the people of the third district support the Government. Hon. Fred. Peters is one of the representatives of that district, yet the hon. member for Belfast was thinking of bringing in a Bill to legislate him out of his seat. Why has not Hon. F. Peters as good a right to represent a district here and practice law in B. C. as for Sir Herbert Tupper to represent Pictou and practice in B. C? What is the difference? Last winter a few Tories tried to get a petition signed asking Mr. Peters to resign, but they could not get any Liberals to sign it. Hon. Mr. Peters has done a great deal for that district and the people appreciate it.

Mr. Shaw asked the Speaker to show returns for \$237, the amount of pauper money allotted to the Speaker for his district. Speaker Cumiskey gave the names of a number of persons in his district who had received pauper money for distribution. He challenged Mr. Shaw to make his charge formally with names and falling that to withdraw his statement. He dared Mr. Shaw to show that he had misappropriated one dollar.

3,500 BRITISH PRISONERS RELEASED.

LONDON, June 8.—(Special)—Very little war news is received. The belief is that about 3,500 British prisoners have been released and about 1,000 are still held by the Boers as hostages.

A MIS DIRECTED SHELL.

The only shell that took effect in Pretoria wrecked the American Consulate.

ORGANISING NEW GOVERNMENT.

A portion of Sir Alfred Milner's staff has gone to Pretoria to organize the new Transvaal Government.

WARREN AND THE CANADIANS.

Gen. Warren with a strong force, including the Canadian Artillery is marching north through Grigqualand West.

PLUMER AND BUNDLE ACTIVE.

Many rebels are handing in their arms. Col. Plumer from Mafeking has occupied Zeerust.

BOERS GOT THEIR GUNS AWAY.

The British officers at Daspoort refused to leave their quarters and made the Boer commandant a prisoner, releasing him at midnight on the condition that he would cancel the order for the removal of the prisoners. The Pretoria forts were found without guns. All the artillery had been gotten away.

SOME CASH AND MRS. KRUGER LEFT.

Mrs. Kruger is still occupying the presidency. Boer officials removed £300,000 in gold from the National bank June 4, but did not touch the cash holdings of the other banks.
