is limited to members in full communion, how can such "congregations" vote at all? It is perfectly evident that the congregational unit is illogical and misleading.

The Vote in Congregations Reported as Unanimous for Union

Another ingenious device is to count for Union all who have not yet voted against it. As the time allowed for the vote has only half expired this basis of calculation is as unsound as the other.

A number of the congregations called Unanimous have already voted. Others are preparing to vote. As the Union Committee has itself explained, any one of these congregations, except in Saskatchewan and Alberta, "may have a veto secured upon it."

Many meetings have been held at which resolutions were passed to enter Union unanimously without a vote. Such resolutions have no legal value. There is no such provision in the Act except in Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Support of Aid-Receiving Churches

Many missions and augmented churches have received the impression that their only hope of future support is through entering the United Church.

The Presbyterian Association, having fairly clear idea of what would happen when the vote was taken, issued in December, a circular to all these aid-receiving congregations assuring support to such as voted to remain out of Union.

At that time there was no proof that the claims of the Association were well founded. But what is now the case? Nearly 500 congregations have voted against Union of which less than 100 pay a lower stipend than \$1500.

In the Union Committee's list, on the contrary, at least three-fourths of the mission preaching stations, many, as already pointed out, without members or property, little or no income, and a few, in the summer conducted by a student.

The other two Churches entering the Union have already mission work which taxes their capacity.

They are not in a position to shoulder the burden for the section of the Presbyterian Church which is to unite with them and which will have to face a large problem in Home Mission work.

Two Provinces Still To Vote.

New Brunswick and Manitoba have still to vote after June 10th. Unless they receive some remedial legislation they will have to face the full measure of difficulty planned by the Union Committee for the Whole Church, from which Parliament provided a way of escape where Provincial Legislation did not make it impossible.

Why Vote Against Union?

But why have so many of the most solid congregations in Canada taken this stand against Union?

All are agreed that in small places union is the only possible arrangement. All Presbyterians alike stand for that. A method of co-operation had been devised before organic union was dreamed of. It was not perfect but it worked pretty well.

Fundamental Objections To This Union.

The people are not so willing to exchange their firm, stable standards of faith for a statement of doctrine which may be changed at any time by the Church Courts.

Neither are the people so willing to sacrifice the liberties for which their fathers sacrificed all, even life itself. It is vain to pretend that these liberties are preserved.

"The Call," the most precious of Presbyterian liberties, is nominaly retained, but there is not a word of provision for any minister to accept or decline the call. It is merely a suggestion to a Synodical Committee which has absolute power over the pastoral relation.

Many Thousands Say No!

FEEDING MEAT BY-PRODUCTS IN HOPPERS TO HOGS.

(Experimental Farms Note.)

The value of organic supplements for hog feeding has been demonstrated in a number of tests completed during the past few years on the Dominion Experimental Farms.

In a feeding test conducted with four lots of Yorkshire hogs, two commercial meat meals were fed in self-feeding hoppers as supplements to the meal ration which in this instance contained milk as well.

The addition of the meat by-products increased the gains but this

The test commenced on January 9th and continued for a period of 90 days. Each lot included seven pigs averaging from 44 to 60 pounds in weight.
