(Canadian Press) LONDON, ENG., Oct. 20--Some months ago the Glasgow Trade Commissioner reported that there was a market in Scotland for Canadian horses. Twenty horses have since been despatched from Seaford, Ontario, to Glasgow, and last week twenty more Percherons have arrived for the same purpose. Further shipment will consist of Clydesdales for carrier firms.

Police Head Hurt In Revolver Duel

(Canadian Press) WILMINGTON, Del., Oct. 20--Engaging in a revolver duel, with a suspected member of the police department at midnight last night on the lawn of his home, George Black, superintendent of the police department and secretary of the International Association of Police Chiefs, was shot and slightly wounded. Black's assailant, the police say, was Thomas Blakeley, who was suspended a week ago, when he was arrested on a charge of assault and battery preferred by a woman neighbor of the officer. Blakeley was shot in the head by Black and is in a critical condition in a hospital. Black was shot in the chest. (Canadian Press) LONDON, ENG., Oct. 20--The Canadian Red Cross office in London is now permanently closed and Mrs. Hatfield Fraser, who has been its representative is returning to Canada.
