Kirkland-Bellevue Parishes Honor Rev. J. E. O'Brien

(Catholic Northwest Progress) In compliment to the Rev. J. E. O'Brien, until recently pastor of the Kirkland-Bellevue parishes, who left to assume the pastorate of the Holy Cross parish in Tacoma, the people of the Kirkland parish gave a reception, Thursday evening, Sept. 10, in the parish house, Mesdames Henry Dorian, P. J. Hiller, J. J. O'Leary, R. E. Sample, John Herton, and C. C. Dobbs, acted as hostesses and the home was crowded with friends of Father O'Brien's, not only Catholics but non-Catholics as well. A purse was presented Fr. O'Brien, Mr. Henry Dorian, making the presentation speech. Fr. O'Brien spoke in farewell to his Kirkland parishioners and friends, thanking them for their loyal co-operation, their affection and expressing sorrow that the end of duty was taking him from their midst. Another extremist attempt to pledge the Labor party to the principle of a weekly wage of \$1 and a week of 44 hours hardly gained any support at all, and J. R. It is nothing new to hear Liberal politicians thundering the greatest bunk against Protection. But they do not speak truthfully, therefore their thunder is as harmless, when understood, as it is noisy. They do not speak of a Protective tariff. Oh no, they think that would not sound strong enough. They wish to define the Conservative policy, and therefore keep on bellying against a "high" Protective tariff. It would appear from the way they shout that they desire to form both Conservative and Liberal policy. This is decidedly characteristic of a man with a weak argument. That is just this one drawback, and to our shame and misfortune it is this one drawback that the Liberals are fighting to have perpetuated!
