

# EASTERN STARS DEFEAT ROVERS BY SCORE OF 14-5

Pittsburgh, Oct. 13.—Eddie Moore's homer and Ray Kremer's brilliant pitching gave the Pirates their second straight victory over the Senators today 3 to 2, tying the World Series at three games each.

In the eighth innings Ballou endeavored to hold the Pirates and Leibold was sent in as a pinch hitter to see if he could solve Kremer's delivery, but to no avail. Moore had cracked out the winning run and to make sure it would be chalked up on the boards, he dropped it directly in front of the score board.
