Local and Other Items.

AFTER IRON ORE.—The search for iron ore is going on in and around Louisburg as well as other parts of Cape Breton.

CHEESE AND BUTTER.—Cheese and butter continue very dull and heavy in the Montreal and Ontario markets, with 8 1/2¢ bid on country cheese boards.

ST. JOHN EXHIBITION.—The recent exhibition in St. John was the means of putting \$150,000 in circulation. The leading merchants of that city are consequently agitating for an annual exhibition.

PERMISSION TO SUE.—Decision has just been given by the courts that the Winnipeg City Council has the right to sue the Canadian Pacific railway for arrears of school taxes. The company claim that its general tax exemption on works in Winnipeg includes school taxes.

A VALUABLE COAT.—A man named George King, who died suddenly at the Albion Hotel, Halifax, recently, left to his heirs (a brother and sister) a rather valuable coat, in the lining of which were found bank notes, bank deposit receipts and a savings bank book, representing the sum of \$1,766 00.

IRELAND'S GREAT JUMPERS.—Ireland can lay claim to having the two best jumpers in the world in Newburn, of Dublin, and Leaty, of Charleville. The 24 feet 6 1/2 inches of the former, got in the long jump at Mullingar and the 6 feet 5 inches of the latter, at Kamlurk, will be very hard to beat.

APPLES FOR GREAT BRITAIN.—The Furness liner London City sailed yesterday with a large number of passengers and a large cargo including over 14,000 barrels of Nova Scotia apples—the second largest shipment of fruit this season for London. —Halifax Herald

PRESBYTERIAN MISSIONS.—The expenditure upon Presbyterian missions in Canada for the past six months exceeded \$39,000. This is owing principally to the big outlay in connection with the Klondike. The estimate for the year is \$82,000.

MYSTERY EXPLAINED.—The mystery surrounding the murder of sixteen-year old Daisy Smith, whose body was found near home at Selinas Grove, Pa., by her father, riddled with shot and with a gaping knife wound in her neck, has been cleared by the confession of Edward Krissinger, who was arrested on suspicion soon after the discovery of the body. Krissinger says that the girl had jilted him and that he had killed her.

LEFT A FORTUNE.—The recent death of Glasgow of James B Thomson has revealed the history of a strange character. While living all his life in squalid penury, denying himself every comfort, he spent vast sums annually to relieve the distress of others. Mr Thomson, though his will disposed of a fortune of \$500,000 to public charities, was always regarded as a poor man. He lived in a small house, cooked his own food and refused to admit anyone into his house. The will stipulates several legacies to private individuals, ranging from \$10,000 downward.

A Fancy For Old Hats.
The inhabitants of the Nicobar islands, a group in the Indian ocean, have an extraordinary fancy for old hats, and a regular trade in such cast off headgear is carried on between Calcutta and Nicobar, the much desired headpieces being paid for in coconuts. A tall chimney pot is the favorite among the Nicobarians, and the acme of fashion is considered to be a high white hat with a black hatband. This is worth from 50 to 60 coconuts, and is worn by the Nicobarian dandy when he goes out fishing, the rest of his attire consisting solely of a waistcoat.
