PAUL'S CONCERN

Purity Of Teaching, Conduct

The pastoral Epistles assigned for the last quarter are somewhat, a parallel to the final addresses given by the great leaders of Israel—Moses, Joshua and Samuel—at the time of their departure.

All of Paul's epistles begin with similar greetings, personal, but crowded with doctrinal truths stating his apostolic position and obligations and reminding the addressee of his heart and good conscience.

The Pastoral Epistles are im-

portant for several reasons. They are the final communications of the greatest missionary and apostle which the church has ever known; they contain the most fully developed discussion of the qualifications for church officers to be found in the New Testament; they are a fully developed treatment of the nature and purpose of the Scriptures; and they are the fullest instructions of a minister given by the Lord.

These persons did not understand the great revelation they were trying to teach and the result was bombastic wordiness and quarrels over trivial matters which would lead to the passing by of the great truths of the faith.

This teaching of an unsound gospel was contrary to Christian doctrine and as great a sin as those breaking the Ten Commandments, and were Paul dresses to catalogue several types of sins also in absolute contradiction to Christian teaching. The Law, he asserts, stands in judgment upon them all.

He concludes this paragraph with an excluded statement regarding the glory of God, that blessed state which those who have the true gospel may attain. Perhaps the apostle found it necessary to re-charge God's glory with its old force because of the Ephesians' attempt to teach an unsound gospel.

Nazi General Shows 15 Years

MUNICH (AP)—Former SS Gen. Karl Wolff, who surrendered part of Germany's army in the Second World War, has been sentenced to 15 years hard labor for his part in the wartime murder of 300,000 Jews in Poland.

The court found Wolff, 64, former top aide to SS boss Heinrich Himmler, guilty of aiding and abetting murder. Wolff described by the court as "the eyes and ears" of Himmler, originally was charged with complicity in murder.

WARSAW (Reuters)—Thirty-four persons were injured, 182 of them seriously, when a bus collided with a truck near Lomza, northern Poland. The news agency PAP reported Wednesday.
