

Double Taxation In Quebec Is Threatened By Johnson

 QUEBEC (CP) — Quebec will get the money it is asking from Ottawa or else it will institute double taxation in the province Premier Daniel Johnson said here.

Mr. Johnson made the statement before the start of a cabinet meeting at which the main topic of discussion was to be the series of federal-provincial talks due to begin Monday at Ottawa.

He said:

"Let's get some action. If we don't come to an agreement at Ottawa, we will come back and we will tax."

"If there is double taxation, Ottawa will be responsible for it."

At a meeting of the tax structure committee Monday, Mr. Johnson is expected to repeat his previous request for 100 per cent of succession duties, personal income tax and corporate income tax on natural resources companies. He also has asked for almost 100 per cent of corporate income tax revenues of all other Quebec-based companies.

"One way to drive Quebec out of Confederation is for Ot-

tawa to continue and keep on with what it is doing."

Mr. Johnson also said that if Ottawa agrees to any measures which would affect education across the country, Quebec will opt out and "demand unconditional fiscal equivalents."

Quebec maintains that education is a strictly provincial responsibility and that any monies received from the federal government for education should be granted with no strings attached.

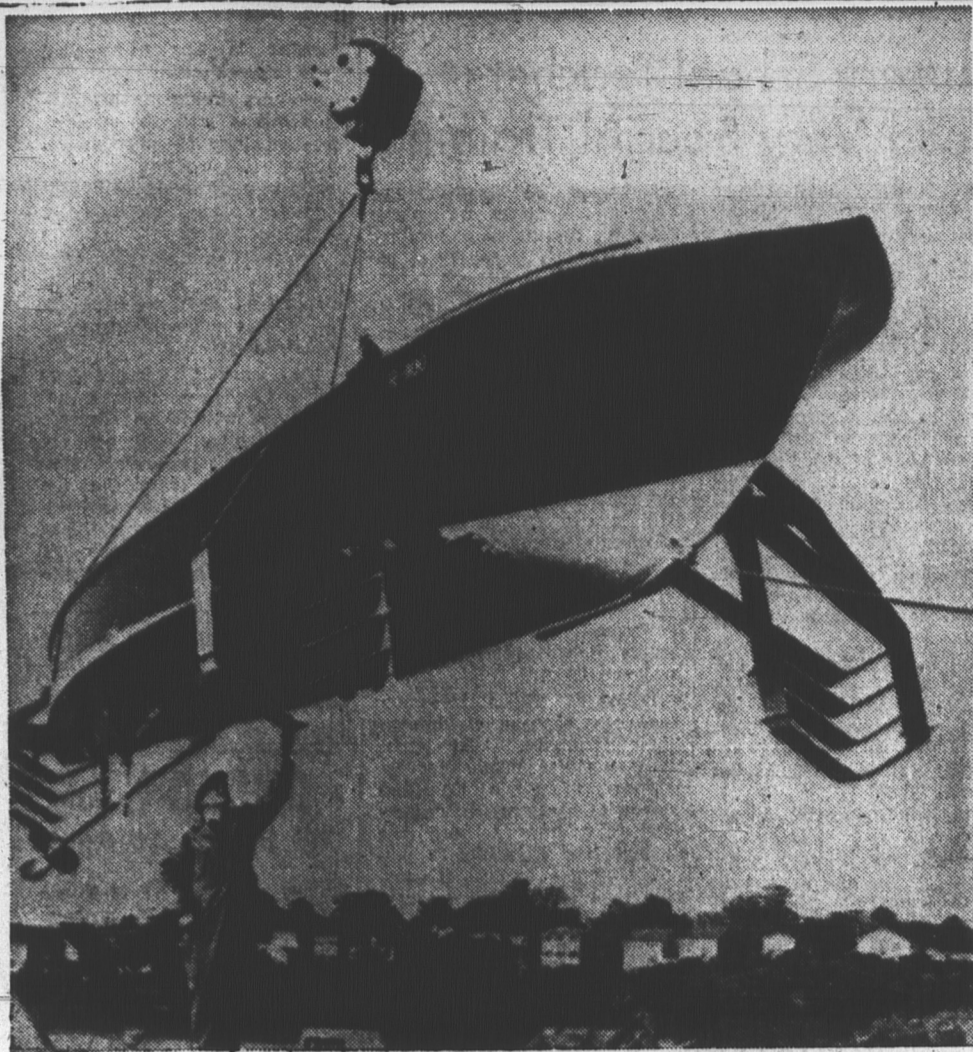
